THE CELEBRATION OF AMERICA'S FREEDOM AND ALSO OUR HISTORY OF GUN VIOLENCE

Brothers and Sisters.

A belated very Happy Fourth of July. I am sorry I could not attend the 8:30 am Mass on Monday and the ritual of burning frayed flags. I have been praying and pondering what to say in this newsletter.

I have lived on and off in Chicago for close to 25 years and I have good friends in Highland Park and Lake Forest. What happened to the people at the parade, there could have happened to us in Safety Harbor's Parade. A mother of a twenty-two-year-old was next to her mother when she was shot in the chest and died. A two-year old was found underneath his dead father with his Dad's blood on him. His mother was also killed, so he is now an orphan going to live with his grandparents. His life is forever changed. How do we explain or justify that violence to ourselves and our children? So far this year there have been 309 mass shootings using these military arsenal rifles, aka MK15's and MK17's, readily available for purchase. I think our Catholic conscience invites us to prayer and reflection. WWJD? We also need to hold in prayer our brothers and sisters and children in Highland Park who experienced this unbelievable violence.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel: July 16th

Our Lady of Mount Carmel or Virgin of Carmel is the title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her role as patroness of the Carmelite Order, particularly within the Catholic Church. The first Carmelites were Christian hermits living on Mount Carmel in the Holy land during the late 12th and early to mid-13th century. This feast, instituted in the 14th century by the Carmelite order, commemorates the anniversary of the day in 1251 when the Blessed Mother gave the brown scapular to Saint Simon Stock. "Even now, centuries removed from that original experience and even in places where there are no Carmelites, this holy scapular is still seen as a sign of Mary's protection and a sign that continues to call people and make them feel that they are the beloved children of the Virgin Mary" (Saint Paul VI). Our Lady invites us to imitate her in a contemplative union with Jesus. "Mary was the first, in a way which can never be equaled, to believe and experience that Jesus, the incarnate Word, is the summit, the peak of man's encounter with God" (Pope Benedict XVI).

Psalms can be songs but they can also be tough. Psalm 58 is known as a Miktam from David. A miktam is "something that covers" but it is an obscure term and, in this case, David is kind of taking the covers off as he directly challenges God as a fair judge of His people. Essentially, David is questioning all the evil that exists in the world and asks God to "smash the teeth in their mouths" and take them on directly and ferociously. This month we are called to address the unfortunates in our society to serve the lonely and abandoned. As a council and an assembly, we do that in many ways to cover the "miktam" of Christ, simply, "Love one another as I have loved you". The trick is that the "as" may also require some sacrifice and hard work.



Psalm 58 Do you indeed pronounce justice, O gods; do you judge fairly you children of Adam? No, you freely engage in crime; your hands dispense violence to the earth. The wicked have been corrupt since birth; liars from the womb, they have gone astray. Their venom is like the venom of a snake, like that of a serpent stopping its ears, so as not to hear the voice of the charmer or the enchanter with cunning spells. O God, smash the teeth in their mouths; break the fangs of these lions, LORD! Make them vanish like water flowing away; trodden down, let them wither like grass. Let them dissolve like a snail that oozes away, like an untimely birth that never sees the sun. Suddenly, like brambles or thistles, have the whirlwind snatch them away. Then the just shall rejoice to see the vengeance and bathe their feet in the blood of the wicked. Then people will say: "Truly there is a reward for the just; there is a God who is judge on earth!"

Roe V Wade: What Next?

In a historic decision the Supreme Court has upheld a Mississippi law that would ban abortion after 15 weeks of pregnancy, but also to overturn the nearly half-century precedent set in Roe v. Wade that guaranteed the constitutional right to an abortion. With the Dobbs decision, states have the ability to set their own restrictions, so where people live will determine their level of access to abortion. The majority opinion, written by Justice Samuel Alito, stated that "the Constitution does not confer a right to abortion; Roe and Casey [Planned Parenthood v. Casey, 1992] are overruled; and the authority to regulate abortion is returned to the people and their elected representatives."

MSN has written on article covering five things to know about this ruling and I think our brothers and ladies will find it interesting. Let's just say, this isn't over by a long shot. Evil still lurks in the heart of men. The Shadow knows. Below is a synopsis of the article that pretty much lays out the elements of a game plan for the pro-abortion crowd.

- Where is abortion still legal? This will evolve quickly with the ruling but 16 states (mostly east and west coast) and the District of Columbia allow abortions. However, there is a wide of variety of political positions, including several states that have abortion rights in their constitutions that may again be challenged at the ballot box in those states.
- 2. What will Biden do? His legal and executive options are somewhat limited by this ruling. But our supposed "devout Catholic President has said this was a "sad day" and that, without Roe, "the health and life of women in this nation is now at risk." However, there is a major wrinkle. Supporters of abortion rights and Democratic lawmakers in Congress have pushed the administration to make it easier for women to obtain medication abortion, which is available up to 10 weeks of pregnancy and involves taking two pills, assessing whether services could be provided on federal property even in states that ban the procedure, and bolstering digital privacy to protect patients. According to the Guttmacher Institute, a research organization that supports abortion rights, the pills accounted for more than half of all abortions

in 2020, the first-year medication provided the majority. So, this may be a tough pill to swallow.

- 3. Will people in states where abortion is illegal be able to access medication abortion? For now, as a result of the Dobbs decision, states that ban abortions are likely to set limitations or bans on abortion pills as well. But some advocates note that people in those states still may be able to obtain abortion pills and perform a "self-managed" abortion at home, which carries some additional risk if the woman has a complication (though complications are very rare). And abortion pills will still be accessible in states where abortion is allowed. There is lot more to this so look for more litigation here.
- 4. How will this affect a doctor's ability to provide care? This aspect gets into other technical medical procedures that can be medically necessary to address the life or safety of the mother. For example, patients who have a miscarriage also sometimes need to take abortion medication or have dilation and curettage surgery known as a D&C to remove tissue that lingers inside the uterus. "The challenge is that the treatment for an abortion and the treatment for a miscarriage are exactly the same," explained a noted doctor.
- 5. Could this affect more than abortion? Doctors say pregnancy begins when a fertilized egg implants in a woman's uterus. But many anti-abortion activists say it begins when a sperm and egg unite to form a zygote, which can happen several days earlier. That earlier time frame would mean that anything that interferes with the implantation of that fertilized egg, such as an IUD (intrauterine device), a common form of birth control, could be defined as an abortion. Similarly, in vitro fertilization, which involves removing a woman's eggs, fertilizing them, and then implanting them back into the woman, could also be construed to involve abortion unless every fertilized egg was implanted. Plus, in his written opinion, Justice Clarence Thomas, suggested that the court could use the same arguments in the Dobbs case to overturn other key rulings, including those that established the rights to birth control and same-sex marriage. It was not clear that the other justices agreed, and Justice Samuel Alito, who wrote the main opinion, said he did not believe the abortion decision affected other issues.

from the desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

LAST MONTH, I wrote about the courage that is needed to be a Knight in a culture that often opposes what we stand for as Catholic men. Some may be called to a decisive act of bravery in the face of overwhelming danger. Consider the Knights who faced martyrdom before firing squads in Mexico in the 1920s while proclaiming "Viva Cristo Rey!" Less dramatic, but equally important, is the daily self-sacrifice to which we are all called. Answering that call also requires heroism. And this spirit of self-sacrifice should characterize our work to defend the unborn and build a culture of life.

Standing for life often requires quiet courage. It means making personal sacrifices for women and children in need — being willing to give of our time, skills and financial resources, and accepting the fact that the fruits of our labors are often hidden. It means facing scorn and derision simply for affirming that every life matters.

Courageously standing for life does not mean being antagonistic or confrontational. When helping vulnerable women, ours should be an attitude of generosity and empathy, not judgment. Even when we are confronted with militant hatred by abortion's defenders, we are called to respond with love. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you" (Lk 6:27-28).

Following this commandment is not weakness — quite the opposite. It is a sign of strength and confidence in the Lord and the righteousness of our cause.

The Church has consistently defended the right to life and has boldly called for building a culture of life in response to a culture of death. The Knights of Columbus has proclaimed this teaching widely and has taken exceptional steps to support vulnerable mothers and unborn children. And we will continue our work to enshrine the right to life in the laws of the land, in new and renewed ways.

Supporting a culture of life means more than simply being opposed to abortion. However, as the U.S. bishops have noted, with more than 63 million innocent human lives lost to abortion in the United States since Roe v. Wade, no more urgent, no more "preeminent" issue has faced us in recent decades. For this reason, our support for women and children has been both direct and constant. Earlier this year, we passed a major milestone in our Ultrasound Initiative, placing our 1,500th machine in a pregnancy resource center.

Our support for family life has also been unwavering, as have our charitable programs providing food, coats and other material aid to vulnerable families. In fact, you could say that through nearly all of our programs, the Knights of Columbus affirms the dignity and goodness of human life.

This notably includes our councils' and members' support for pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes in their communities. By forging strong relationships with these centers, Knights are helping to meet the needs of countless women and children.

I recently announced a \$5 million campaign to deepen this support. The program is called ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy), and I am confident our councils will rise to meet this challenge.

For every \$500 a council gives to a qualifying pregnancy resource center or maternity home (up to \$2,000), the Supreme Council will make an additional \$100 donation to that center or home. ASAP is roughly modeled on the Knight's RSVP initiative — which, since 1981, has provided more than \$86 million dollars to seminarians and religious in formation. Imagine if we can do that for vulnerable women and children.

To restore a true culture of life, each of us must stand up and give all that we can. In this moment, the Lord is calling us to be noble in our continued sacrifice for mothers and children. We must renew our commitment and dedicate ourselves once again to this simple, but heroic, path.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
