Chaplain's Corner

"I didn't really mean it!"

Two weeks ago, there was a letter to "Dear Abbey," where the woman asked for some advice. She was at the door of her daughter-in-law, when she made some negative comments to her son about his wife. Somehow it was recorded on their Ring doorbell and the daughter-in-law found out. She is very angry and refuses to accept her mother-in-law's apology and has said she does not know if she will ever be able to forgive her. The son is welcomed but the daughter-in-law is not and she may never see her granddaughter again. The damage is done. "But I didn't mean it!" Yes, you did mean it because you said it. Maybe your guard was down or you were tired, but you did say it.

This scenario invites us to examine our attitudes towards others—family, race, or whatever. If we find ourselves—myself included—judgmental, angry, or just negative, we need to explore that and pray about it. Maybe we need to let it go, because the other person is different or just not like me. Maybe who they are or what they say annoys me. Maybe I need to deal with it, lest it get out of hand as it did with that woman. Can I bring some understanding of what bothers me and how I can let it go or at least not let it destroy me, my family, or my faith. Harsh anger and judgment can affect not only the other but me. Such anger eats away at my peace of mind. It is not healthy and can even lead to a heart attack!

I cannot change a person if they do not want to change. Maybe I can say a wise word to a friend who acts this way but maybe I need to first take my negative and judgmental attitudes to prayer and maybe to a counselor or to a good friend, so I can get it out before it eats away at me. Often, I have no idea why an individual says or does something that really annoys me. I definitely have people in my life who push my buttons for what they do or do not do or because of their attitudes. I need to explore my response lest it eat away at my spirit. I do not have to agree with the other nor I do need not to give them power over my emotions. I need to pray and journal about my response and get some peace and equilibrium. Not easy but anger and negativity can kill. We each need to deal with it. No easy answer but exploring our attitudes can be very healing and transformative. As Ignatius Loyola might counsel, "Take it to the Lord and have a conversation which includes listening."

From the Community Director

Brothers, as we begin our fraternal year, there will be several opportunities for enhancement of our greater community, through service. The first of these will be through picking up our commitment for the road cleanup of Enterprise Road. This is a project we committed to

several years ago to maintain the cleanliness of the road from the railroad tracks (west of the Church) moving east to Philippe Parkway. With a few volunteers, this is estimated to take no more than hour. We would like to begin this project on Saturday, October 8th and do it monthly on each second Saturday. We plan to meet at 9 am at the Church and hope to be done by 10 am. Vests will be provided for this worthwhile project.

From the Life Director

October is our month to stand out in front of the abortion clinic on US HWY 19 in Clearwater. The three Thursdays that we need to support from 7am to 5pm are the 3rd,13th and the 20th. Please sign up for a two hour-shift and pray for an end to abortion. We will have baby bottles at both the council and the Ladies Auxiliary Meeting to take home for collecting loose change and bills to support the Kimberly Home in Clearwater.

SAINT PIUS OF PIETELCINA:

Pius was born Francesco, of poor farm workers in Pietrelcina, Italy. From a young age, he longed to become a Capuchin. His father traveled to America to earn the money to support his son's vocation. In 1903 he took the Capuchin habit, and he was ordained seven years later. From 1918 to his death, Padre Pio bore the visible stigmata, the wounds of Christ – a gift he prayed to have removed, but finally accepted. His fame spread widely, and with this came suspicion, false accusations, and repeated investigation by the Holy Office. "It is under the cross that one learns to love," he said. Padre Pio died in 1968. Padre Pio is known as the Saint of healing and hope. For fifty years countless people journeyed to the remote Italian village of San Giovanni Rotondo to seek Padre Pio's prayers and assistance, and he welcomed them with open arms. Some people were healed instantaneously, some were healed gradually, and some experienced not a physical healing, but an inward, emotional and spiritual healing. Padre Pio was concerned with the suffering of those who were not cured. This need led Padre Pio to initiate the building of a magnificent hospital in San Giovanni Rotondo, the Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza, the House for the Relief of Suffering, where the sick would be cared for as if they were Christ himself. Padre Pio often said, "Pray, hope and don't worry. Worry is useless. God is merciful and will hear your prayer. Prayer is the best weapon we have; it is the key to God's heart."

In Loying Memory of Brother Knight Devin E. Cote

Born: December 11, 2001 Died: August 2, 2022

As I looked around my 3rd grade Religious Education classroom, one 8-year-old young boy stood out from all the rest. He was quiet and shy and always sat in the front row but eagerly participated in classroom discussions and always took notes. I asked him one evening as we were leaving class why he always took notes and he explained to me that he wanted to remember everything that we discussed so that he could share it with his family. That young boy, who I watched grow into a fine young man, was Devin. I was blessed to continue to be his RE catechist through his 8th grade and Confirmation. It was truly humbling to see the thirst for knowledge that Devin showed for his Catholic faith.

Ever since 4th grade Devin expressed an interest in becoming a Knight of Columbus and I was given the opportunity to be his sponsor in February 2020 when he turned 18. Devin stepped up and eagerly participated in all Knights events, just like he did when he was an 8-year-old young boy in the RE classroom participating in classroom discussions. He was often seen serving at Knights dinner dances and helping out at the Gold tournament fundraisers.

Devin had a servant's heart like no young person I have ever met. He was a dedicated altar server for the past 8 years, often serving at more than one Mass on a weekend. He was one of the youngest sacristans we have ever had at Espiritu Santo. In addition, he was a talented musician, often playing in the family choir when he wasn't altar serving. And, back to that young 8-year-old, he gave back to the RE program by becoming an assistant catechist and encouraging 8th grade students in the Confirmation program to find their place in their Catholic faith by serving others.

Devin was a young man with a strong faith, a dedicated musician, an athlete, and a leader. He has truly showed us what Jesus meant when he said in Mark 10:45 "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve...". Devin's record of service to the Church was without equal for someone of his age and an example for all of us of what it truly means to be Jesus in this world.

I know Devin is now in the Lord's embrace and He is saying "welcome home, good and faithful servant."

from the desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

ON DEC. 10, 1979, a little Albanian woman wearing a white and blue sari stood before some of most powerful leaders on earth and received one of the world's highest honors — the Nobel Peace Prize. That day, the diminutive giant, Mother Teresa of Calcutta, was honored for, as the award stated, "bringing help to suffering humanity" and "attention to the plight of children and refugees."

Mother Teresa immediately gave away the Nobel's monetary award to build shelters for the poorest of the poor. She gave all glory to God. But she also gave a great gift to the world — a reorientation of our understanding of true poverty and of the foundations of peace.

In her speech to the dignitaries gathered to praise her, Mother Teresa boldly stated, "The greatest destroyer of peace today is the cry of the innocent unborn child. For if a mother can murder her own child in her own womb, what is left for you and for me to kill each other?"

Her listeners were dumbstruck.

This dramatic moment is one of numerous evocative scenes in the new, feature-length documentary Mother Teresa: No Greater Love, which will be in select U.S. theaters Oct. 3-4.

It would not be the last time Mother Teresa would be so bold — not by a long shot. Her 1985 address to the United Nations and her witness at the 1994 National Prayer Breakfast in Washington, D.C., come to mind. She was the very face of kindness, but her clarity and conviction frequently left world leaders uncomfortable.

'Mother Teresa reminded us that if we truly want to live up to the ideals of justice and equality for all, we must start by respecting the dignity and the worth of every human life, made in the image and likeness of God.'

And for this, there was no better messenger, because Mother Teresa lived this reality every day. No one could rival her total gift of self in her love for the poor and the vulnerable.

Mother Teresa was the world's most credible witness for a culture of life precisely because she saw the face of Christ in those she served. When she was feeding the hungry or holding the hand of someone who was dying, she was doing so to the most important person in her life, Jesus Christ himself. This was the source of her authenticity and consistency.

Her words matched her actions, and her actions matched her words. She had the courage to speak the truth because she had a heart that burned with love, and that love was matched by a life of sacrifice for others. In a general audience address last year, Pope Francis emphasized this link between truth and love: "Let us not be afraid to be truthful, to speak the truth, to hear the truth, to conform ourselves to the truth, so we can love."

This is the witness the world needs now. And I believe Knights and their families are the ones to offer it.

While none of us can be St. Teresa of Calcutta, each of us can demonstrate, through our care for our families, the poor and all those around us, the dignity and worth of every person.

This mission fits perfectly with that of Blessed Michael McGivney and the work of the Knights. It's why we've launched our new ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy) program — and why, for decades, councils and Knights have been there for women in need, through our Ultrasound Initiative and other works.

The world needs to hear that we stand for life, because every life is of inestimable value and goodness. Our society needs us to proclaim that message boldly, and then to back up our words by laying down our lives for mothers and children, in love. Indeed, there is "no greater love" (Jn 15:13).



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


