

Chaplain's Corner

We have been bombarded and rightfully so with all the damages and destruction from Hurricane Ian. It makes me think of that old cliché, "God never sends us more than we can handle." I do not understand this. The shrimpers who lived on their uninsured forty-year-old boats on Ft. Myers Beach and have lost everything would find that cliche hard to take. Floridians in other parts of Southwest Florida and across the state and up into the Carolinas, who have lost everything or close to it would also have trouble with that cliché. It is simply not true in too many people's experiences.

Why has it stuck around for so long. Maybe some took this cliché as a word of encouragement to not give up and to give the tragedy one's best shot. Maybe for others it was moralistic. It God sent this tragedy, all I can do is to try to stand up to it. But in point of fact, our God does not send these tragedies-be it damage from a hurricane, illness, depression, financial ruin, or whatever. These things happen for any number of reasons, or they just happen. However, our God is not the cause of these mishaps. Our God is not a punitive jokester. When difficulties happen, I like to suggest that our God is crying with us.

So, what do we do? AS Ignatius Loyola suggested in the sixteenth century, "take it to prayer and discernment" in conversation with the Lord. Maybe we just have to live with a situation-with the Lord's help. But maybe, we need to talk to someone-a close friend, a priest or deacon, a counselor. Maybe we need to let go and change ourselves. Perhaps we need to tell the person who caused this how much hurt they caused. No matter what,

We also need to remind ourselves that the Lord is walking with us as a friend and source of strength as well as wisdom as we face these situations.

While we are on the subject of cliches, another false one is that "everything happens for a reason" or that "God allows or permits these things to happen." Not true. Our God can be involved in good things that happen, because that is the kind of God we have. However, God does not permit or allow bad things to happen. Difficulties and tragedies do happen but in no way is God involved in them.

So, some things do happen for a bad reason-a mistake I or someone else makes. Or simply the limitation of life. Some things just happen. So, what do I do? I take it to the Lord in prayer to discern what I should do. Maybe that includes talking to someone like a priest or deacon, to a religious, or to a close friend to process the situation. Maybe I have to let it go, but maybe more often than not, I need to do something by way of response. I cannot just let it go and do nothing. I should never return evil for evil, but I cannot just swallow it. We are all adults and need to take ownership of our life situations. We are never alone. We have fellow Knights and close friends. In addition, we have the Holy Spirit, the living presence of Jesus with us to help us deal with the situation.

SAINT THERESE OF LISIEUX

Saint Therese of the Child Jesus and the Holy Face, often called the Little Flower, was born on January 2, 1873, in the Normandy region of France to Louis Martin and Zelie Guerin. She was the youngest daughter of the five surviving Martin girls of a middle-class French family. Because of how short Therese's life was to be, God began drawing her to Himself at a very early age, in a very

intense way. She was born into an extraordinarily devout, warm, and wise Catholic family and had some of the best family instruction in the faith that one can imagine. Eager to follow her two older sisters into the Carmelite monastery of Lisieux, she was finally able to enter at the age of fifteen. She didn't seem to be anything "special" in the convent, but interiorly the Lord was bringing about a great purification in order to unite her to Himself. He was also teaching her great insights into the spiritual journey. In the last few years of her life, she was asked to write down some of her life story, which was published under the title, The Life of a Soul. In it, Therese shared the story of her own journey, "the Little Way" that has inspired millions. She desired to give herself wholeheartedly as a missionary but discovered her work was in the anonymity of the convent: "My vocation is love. In the heart of the Church, my Mother, I shall be love. "My mission-to make God loved- will begin after my death. "I will spend heaven doing good on earth. I will let fall a shower of roses." Countless lives have been touched by her intercession. She has been acclaimed the "greatest saint of modern times." She died a very painful death at the age of twentyfour of tuberculosis. She was canonized a saint in 1925. In 1927, she was declared co-patron of the missions and in 1997, a Doctor of the Church by Pope St. John Paul II. St. Therese said that "what matters most in life is not great deeds, but great love."

Every sport, every enterprise, every organization, every industry has their top reps, their all-stars and their most valuable players. They are the ones who give their all 100% of the time; they represent their companies masterfully, they get customers and retain them, they provide extraordinary service, they inspire their colleagues to reach heights no one thought attainable. Faithful Navigator's Log

October celebrates the namesake of our order, Christopher Columbus. Father McGivney chose Columbus to remind America of its Catholic roots at a time of rising anti Catholic sentiment. Today the woke culture is relentless in spewing revisionist history. The October 2017 issue of Columbia Magazine article "Christopher Columbus and Fake History" presents the truth and refutes the modern revisions. The deep piety of our Order's namesake is totally ignored or presented in a false light of "oppression of native peoples"...

Christopher Columbus was a Third Order Franciscan and was often seen wearing the Franciscan habit. One of his contemporaries, Bartolome de las Casas, a Dominican friar and the first Bishop of Chiapas, wrote of Columbus:

"He observed the fasts of the church most faithfully, confessed and made communion often, read the Divine Office like a churchman, hated blasphemy and profane swearing, and was most devoted to Our Lady and to the seraphic father St. Francis. He was extremely zealous for the honor and glory of God; he deeply yearned for the evangelization of these peoples and for the planting and flourishing everywhere of people's faith in Jesus Christ."

Columbus' flagship on the first voyage was named in honor of Mary, the full name was Santa Maria de la Inmaculada Concepción (Holy Mary of the Immaculate Conception). During the voyage there was a daily evening prayer service, asking for Divine Providence and Protection.

As Columbus set foot on the new land in San Salvador, his first act was to kneel on the beach to give thanks. He recited the following prayer in Latin:

"O Lord, eternal and omnipotent God, Thou hast, by Thy holy word, created the heavens, the earth, and the sea; blessed and glorified be Thy name; praised be Thy majesty, who hast deigned that, by means of Thy unworthy servant, Thy sacred name should be acknowledged and made known in this new quarter of the world."

The above prayer was followed by the chanting of the Credo, the Te Deum, and many other prayers in thanksgiving. He proceeded to claim the new land for his sovereigns, but first claiming it for his Divine Master, giving it the name San Salvador (Holy Savior).

On May 20, 1506, the Vigil of the Ascension, Christopher Columbus lay on his deathbed in his apartment at Valladolid, surrounded by his fellow Franciscans and his sons. As the friars chanted Compline, his last words echoed those of Christ on the cross: In manus tuas, Domine, commendo spiritum meum. (Into your hands, O Lord, I commend my spirit.)

I firmly believe as Knights we have an obligation to arm ourselves with the true facts so we may defend Christopher Columbus and refute revisionist history that so unfairly vilifies this pious and holy man.

Today is Oct 4, so I am late in submitting my article for October. Patty and I are in Gettysburg, PA. Earlier today, we visited the Gettysburg National Military Park Museum. That July 1-3, 1863 battle is deemed decisive, a turning point if you will, in the final outcome of the Civil War. The losses on both sides, for the battle and the whole war, are very sobering. We came away from today's visit having the same thought, that today, we in the USA are going through another civil war of sorts. Back in the 1800s, the issue was slavery. Today, ever since Roe v. Wade, the divisive issue has been abortion.

Some states are promoting their legal-status for abortion. On the drive up here, I saw a billboard sign announcing that North Carolina was still open to abortion. NC is not alone; Illinois, New York, California are also promoting themselves as states to come to for abortion. 



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


