

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Father Al Bishoff is a 95-year old Jesuit, who is probably the most loved and revered campus minister and priest, wherever he has been assigned. He is a good friend of John Gohman when he was a Xavier University and Deacon Greg knows him through his daughter who is a student today at Xavier. I have known Al since I was in grade school because he was a camp counselor in his seminarian days.

Al would always greet young people as well as adults with, "Hello, Saints." The kids loved it, whether they were or not. It was a very positive and loving affirmation of their goodness and his love and appreciation of them. Al recounts how he ran into a former Xavier student and he called him by his first name, John. The young man appeared disappointed, and Al asked him why. The young man said he was hoping to be called "Saint"! Al always brought joy and humor to his greetings. The students deeply appreciated and so should we all.

November is "the month of the holy souls." Actually, in the Early Christian Community they greeted each other similarly, "Hello, Saint." Sometimes we can think of "All Saints" as somebody else than us. I suggest we re-think that understanding of saints as someone other than us. It is time to celebrate the joy of being Catholic and Knights—a great blessing beyond price, as we will at our Memorial Mass on November 17.

November is National Long-Term Care Awareness Month. To mark the occasion, here are 10 interesting facts shared by the American Association for Long-Term Care Insurance.

1 - Americans are living longer, in large part due to advances in medical care and public health. Life expectancy in the US for those reaching 65 was 20 years on average in 2019.

2 - By 2030, one in five residents in the US will be age 65 or older.

3 – The number of people in need of long term support services (LTSS) in the United States is already at 14 million and expected to grow to 27 million by 2050.

4 – Average out-of-pocket costs are \$140,000 for those individuals who utilize paid long term support services (LTSS). Roughly 17 percent will spend over \$100,000 on LTSS. Almost 9 percent will spend over \$250,000 on LTSS.

#5-By 2040, the total prevalence of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias in the US is expected to approximately double from 7.2 million to nearly 13 million, with 8.5 million women and 4.5 million men expected to develop dementia.

6 – For those requiring high levels of LTSS, individuals and families pay 55 percent of long-term care costs out of pocket.

7 – Currently, the majority of older single-person households are female. Women comprised 74 percent of solo households age 80 and over.

#8-Some 7.5 million Americans have some form of longterm care insurance. Two-thirds of all new individual longterm care insurance claims pay for care needed by women.

#9 – The long-term care insurance industry paid out \$11 billion in benefits to some 310,000 individuals with insurance protection in 2019. The number will increase each year as the current number of policyholders grow older and, as a result, are more likely to begin their claim. # 10 - 69.5 percent of new claims start after the policyholder reached age 80. O Lord Be Merciful To Me A Sinner

The Mass readings a couple weeks ago hit me that we are a broken people that live in a broken world. Yet we are individual creations of an all-loving and all forgiving God and made in His image and likeness. On the surface that seems a contradiction in terms. How do we solve that conundrum?

The answer is in the title. Accept the fact that we are sinners and often separate ourselves from the unconditional forgiveness and love of God. This has been the case since Adam and Eve used their free will to taste the forbidden fruit and all the great leaders of the Old Testament from Abraham on broke with their love of God in one way or another.

The Book of Sirach tells us, "The LORD is a God of justice, who knows no favorites. Though not unduly partial toward the weak, yet he hears the cry of the oppressed....The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw till the Most High responds, judges justly and affirms the right, and the Lord will not delay." What is justice? All too often we seem to think that justice is when we get what we want but, in truth, justice is when we get what we deserve. So, when we do break down, we can expect to be corrected in one way or another.

That wisdom from Sirach was followed by a parable in the Gospel of Luke about two people who went up to the Temple to pray. A Pharisee and a tax collector. *"The Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself, 'O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity -- greedy, dishonest, adulterous -- or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income."* Meanwhile the tax collector stood off to the side and would not even look up to Heaven but beat his breast and said *"O Lord, be merciful to me a sinner".*

Which of these two were justified before the Lord? You know the answer to that. Question is which one are we in our prayers and, more importantly, in our actions. Do we talk the talk **AND** walk the walk or do we just talk the talk?

To me this parable raises the question of free will. Gid gave us free will but we seem to consistently and persistently make bad choices all too often. So, is free will really a gift or is it a trap meant to punish us? God is **ALL** powerful, knowing, loving, forgiving but He is **NOT** all-controlling. Love cannot be experienced if one party is controlling the other. So, free will is **THE** greatest gift that provides us the opportunity to conform our will to God's and fully experience His love for us.

Here is a reflection on free will. Be a sinner not a Pharisee.

"We can't live in this world without adversity and our peace must be found in the humble bearing of suffering and contradictions, not in being free of them. In a sense, those who can best suffer, enjoy the most peace. They are masters of themselves. Given this, we shouldn't necessarily pray for an easy life but for the strength to endure the difficult one that original sin delivered us into."



Fall is here, and our holidays are fast and furiously approaching. Let us kept in mind the "Reason for the Seasons". That we are blessed with family, friends, talents, and our abilities to serve others. Most importantly our gift of our Parish and our salvation. Deep breathes during the business and time outs so to enjoy the sounds, smells, and tastes of this season.

Thanksgiving comes to life with our ability to open our minds and abilities shared with others, let's pray for those who have limited resources, those who have suffered loss of loved ones, and those who need direction of our Lord in their lives through these next months of holidays where some people feel so alone.

We are excited to help with our Knights events and support them with the first dinner dance since 2019-2022 K of C calendar. May the turnout be just a beginning of events which our Parishioners have missed. Thanks to all those Ladies who helped with the most successful Gary Sinise Golf Tourney yet.

from the desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

"GOD DID NOT give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control" (2 Tim 1:7). These words from Scripture recently struck me as they were read at Mass. In the preceding days, I had been part of several conversations about the challenges of living our faith today, and I found that this verse from St. Paul spoke both to the tremendous gift we have been given in our Catholic faith and the responsibility we have to share this gift with others.

Whether it's young parents struggling to raise their family in a culture that seems obsessed with pushing adult agendas on children; a Ukrainian father, separated from his wife and children as he struggles for the very existence of his homeland; a college student lacking stable intellectual and spiritual support in an environment increasingly marked by confusion and instability; or everyday Catholics wrestling with their faith in the face not only of open hostility from the world, but also division and scandals in the Church — in each of these cases and more, there is a temptation to do less and to back away.

At times, the adversity is enough to make us give in to cynicism and discouragement and decide to lead a life of ready comfort and diversion — or at least one of general apathy, ready to settle for "good enough" in terms of our growth in virtue and personal excellence.

But this "easy" path leads to a far less meaningful life — and away from true fulfillment. Why? Because we were not made for that kind of life. We were made for a higher purpose, and in Jesus Christ we have been given the grace to live as children of God.

We are called to be great men — not just "pretty good" men. And to achieve this, we are given the very Spirit of God, who can lead us to a hope that will never disappoint and never give in to despair.

St. Paul reminds Timothy that we have been given a spirit of "power and love and self-control." In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul likewise makes clear that he has not been relying on his own skill or wise words, but on the power of God (1 Cor 2:3-5). And in his letter to the Church in Rome, he points out that even our suffering can lead to endurance, and thus to character, and to hope, infused in us by the Holy Spirit (Rom 5:3-5).

We are called to be great men — not just "pretty good" men. And to achieve this, we are given the very Spirit of God, who can lead us to a hope that will never disappoint and never give in to despair.

Moreover, we have a responsibility to help other men recall and understand the Spirit they have been given. It is the duty of a band of Christian brothers, of Catholic gentlemen — of Knights. We Knights of Columbus are called to stand with one another, to encourage one another, and to rely upon our brothers to do the same for us when we are tempted to moments of discouragement.

During this fraternal year, more than 20 of our state councils in the United States and Canada will be exploring ways that Knights of Columbus can better support men in living their faith and embracing the Spirit they have been given in their baptism and confirmation. Local councils will be implementing new programs and structures as we consider how, as an Order, we can become, more and more, the men of faith and courage that Blessed Michael McGivney desired us to be. More will be shared regarding this pilot program in the future, and, God willing, a refined plan for incorporating this way of life in all councils will roll out in the coming year or two.

But our duty to live lives of faith waits for nothing, nor do the challenges facing us. By virtue of our baptism, we have been given the highest of callings, and it demands that we hold nothing back in service to Christ, our King.



A Family Prayer


Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


