Chaplain's Corner

ADVENT—SO WHAT?

We enter the season of Advent. It often seems like a waiting game between Christmas parties, gift-buying, and waiting for Christmas Day. As I said last year, Advent is a very special season to celebrate and deepen our appreciation of the Incarnation, meaning that God chose then and continues to choose to become a human being like us. We rarely hear much about the human side of Jesus. Often things human get a bad rep, "That's just human!"

By becoming a human being God affirms the sacredness and beauty of being human. Advent thus becomes a season to reflect and come to a deeper appreciation of our own humanness and the humanness of others. In Luke 2:44 the Evangelist reminds us that Jesus return home to Nazareth with his family where "he grew in wisdom, age, and knowledge before God and the human family." Jesus had to learn to read like other Jewish children, so he could read the Scriptures in the synagogue. He played with other kids and probably had fights with other kids who caused trouble or even mocked him. He was criticized by the scribes and pharisees for not always keeping the Mosaic law when there was a higher or more pressing value like picking grain on the Sabbath with his disciples, because they were hungry. Jesus was not "a loner ranger," but invited other men to join him in the Mission. Jesus had a good number of women friends like Mary of Magdala, who also joined his company and shared the Mission also. Jesus had a nurturing side and was comfortable with little children.

Moreover, the human Jesus did not have a plastic bubble protecting him from life and its challenges and tragedies. The religious leaders set him up and tried to humiliate him: Should we pay taxes to Caesar? Should we stone this woman taken in adultery? Are you a king?

Advent this year reminds us to spend time appreciation the humanity of Jesus and my own humanity "wondrously made." [Psalm 139:10] I was struck this year by the fact that human beings are different—not all the same. I have caught myself judging others because "they are different. Not like me!" The Incarnation this year invites me to let go and let others be themselves whether they are like me or not! Conservative or Liberal. Democrat or Republican, et cetera Let the Spirit inspire your prayer and reflection.

Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe December 12

On December 9, 1531, Juan Diego, a Chichimeca Indian, encountered a beautiful woman near Mexico City. Speaking in the native Nahuatl, she revealed herself as "Holy Mary, Mother of the True God for whom we live." She requested that a chapel be built. After the local bishop refused to believe Juan, the Virgin herself arranged roses in Juan's rough cloak. When Juan opened the cloak before the bishop, a miraculous image appeared. The bishop was astounded and convinced of the authenticity of the apparition. Numerous volunteers constructed Mary's chapel in less than two weeks. In seven years, eight million native people were converted. Pope St. John Paul II called the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe the "Marian heart of America." This feast day

is celebrated every year on December 12. Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patron Saint of the unborn and of the Americas.

FRATERNAL BENEFITS ADVISOR REPORT

Merry Christmas! To all my brothers and their families, I extend my very best wishes for a Merry and a Blessed Christmas. As we are celebrating the Christmas season, we give thanks that God sent his Only Begotten Son to live among us and save us! That gift from God the Father sets the stage for our giving gifts at Christmas.

It seems we say it every year: "It's Christmas; where did the year go?" Seems like a good time to look back on the year and note all the gifts given by you and our members worldwide. As Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly mentioned in his annual report this year in Nashville, Tennessee, we have much to be thankful for and much more work ahead of us.

Consider these gifts that SK Kelly mentioned. The Order gave more that \$154 million and more than 48 million hours of volunteer service. But those are the big totals. Look at these specifics: we gave the gift of warmth to more than 150,000 children through the Coats for Kids campaign. We gave 8,891 physically challenged individuals the gift of mobility this year through our wheelchair program. We raised more than \$19 million for Ukraine support and gave those families the gift of respite at Mercy Centers and Easter packages. RSVP gave the gift of financial support to nearly 5,900 seminarians or postulants. And we had more than 450,000 members give the gift of life through donating blood.

These are gifts that change lives. Real people, real individuals benefited from these gifts.

but needs to continue. Thankfully, The Kimberly Home and other pregnancy centers continue to offer support for pregnant women and their un-born babies.


So, pray thanks for the blessings we have, for the incremental pro-life successes that have been achieved, and pray for resolve to continue the fight for Life!

In 1989, he met Elizabeth Szeltner (Bailey) and her daughter April Bailey in El Paso, Texas and they went on to have three children who were his pride and joy: Catherine (Matthew) Hadro, Anthony (Madison), and Samuel.

Andy was a 30-year parishioner at Espiritu Santo Catholic Church and was heavily involved in several ministries; he was the longtime coordinator of Lector Ministry and was a Fourth-Degree member of the Knights of Columbus Council 7109. Andy was always quick to step up and help with any and all of the Knights of Columbus events. During the "Drive Up" Fish Fries, he served as one of the "Traffic Cops" directing cars thru the maze of the Order and Pick-up lines.

He spent his last year of life working part-time at the local John Geigle YMCA, where he was known for his big smile and ability to talk to members of all ages. Andrew was an avid golfer, the most reliable airport chauffeur, great sports fan, a faithful Catholic, and the most loving father, brother, and uncle. The Meaning of Advent

Of course, we know the meaning of Advent! It's the start of the Church Year and it means Christmas is coming. We have two other "seasons", Lent where Christ is crucified, resurrected and ascends into Heaven; and Ordinary Time which is all the rest. Ordinary time? Really? Is there anything ordinary about our faith and its Mysteries? That's what got me thinking about advent.

We associate Advent with Christmas so why all the purple vestments? I thought Christmas was a happy time. The Savior is born. The simple answer is the Feast of Christ the King ends our liturgical year and the next Sunday starts Advent. This connotes that Christ has not yet come and Advent is the announcement that something big is about to happen. In that sense, we are warned and encouraged to prepare for the event.

Advent comes from the Latin adventus which means to arrive. The Greek word perousia is also part of the etymology. Perousia means presence.

Actually, Advent signifies three very important things in our faith journey.

- Our celebration of Christ's birth at Christmas
- The coming of Christ in our lives through grace and the Sacrament of Holy Communion
- His second coming at the end of time

So, the Advent season is marked with other signs and symbols, like the Advent Wreath and it's candles of faith, hope, love and joy, helping us to prepare the way; and the readings are chosen to remind us of the three meanings of the season. This year we are on Cycle A with the Gospel's featuring the writings of Matthew. Cycles B and C feature Mark and Luke completing the synoptic Gospels. This is done to make sure we are getting the complete perspective of these three Evangelist's. The Gospel of John is intermixed to add yet another perspective to complete the big picture.

I'll conclude with some extracts of the readings from the first Sunday of Advent which opens the story. First, Paul tells the Romans, "Brothers and sisters, You know the time; it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep. For our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed; But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the desires of the flesh." Basically, I'm not sure when the second coming will happen but clean up your act.

Isaiah then tells us of the impact of our Savior on a society that accepts Him, "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; one nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!" We will have peace IF we recognize the Lord and walk in his ways.

Matthew concludes with the words of Christ, "Therefore, stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come. Be sure of this: if the master of the house had known the hour of night when the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and not let his house be broken into. So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

In sum Advent means we are about to welcome our Savior. We need to reflect and prepare for this event. His arrival will bring us wonderful gifts of peace and love including His own body and blood. And, He will come again in Glory at a time that is unpredictable so we need to stay prepared by following His word.

He expressed his enthusiasm not only through his words, but also by blessing and signing the framed copy of the icon that I had brought to the audience.

I also presented a first-class relic of Blessed Michael McGivney to the Holy Father. His reaction was deeply moving. He took the reliquary from its box, and then, with much reverence, he venerated the relic with a kiss. Pope Francis has already done much to draw attention to Father McGivney's life, and it was clear in that moment that he has a personal appreciation for the exemplary parish priest who founded the Knights of Columbus. That, too, should be a source of pride for every Knight.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


