Chaplain's Corner

HOLY WEEK 2023 UNITATIVE SUFERING AND HOPE IN NEW WAYS

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I have been very moved by the generous labors of so many Knights and Ladies at our Friday Fish Frys. These Fridays are a beautiful example of community, brotherhood, and sisterhood lived in generous and joyful service. I was also very appreciative of the number of Knights and Ladies at the Seder Meal. The event itself was very moving and faithful as well as educational. So how do we celebrate Holy Week in maybe new ways?

I understand the events of Jesus' life we celebrate during Holy Week as suffering due to the social sin around him. The religious leaders were jealous of Jesus. His message of compassion and goodness of a loving God challenged the agenda of those in power. In a very real way it was hate, jealousy, prejudice, and self-serving leadership that killed Jesus. "Better that one man dies for the sake of the nation." The religious and political leaders thought they had gotten rid of Jesus, so they could get on with their evil ways, but God brought Jesus back—Resurrection! Thus, the Easter Narratives celebrate New Life, New Possibilities, New Beginnings, Hope for Jesus and for us not just over sin but over seeming dead ends, limitations, death in many symbolic but very real ways.

To fully enter the Hope of Easter, the Hope and Joy of the Paschal Mystery, I suggest we pray any "death" we are going through and take it to the Lord in prayer to open up new Life and Possibilities. Maybe that includes letting go of some hurts and "deaths" of our own life, so that some New Life and Possibilities can open up. Maybe our own

everyday life and faith are OK. Then I suggest we prayerfully enter the pain and suffering of others, so that we can appreciate what they are going through. We are not looking for "suffering for suffering's sake" but to enter very humanly and compassionately into the suffering and "deaths" of the Christ Today—our brothers and sisters. Maybe we are aware of "the problem" some people are experiencing, for example the People of Pinellas Hope, or the Families we take Easter Baskets for St. Vincent de Paul, those who have lost a loved one, or maybe dealing with being under employed or just out of work. For some of us the experience of aging is our cross.

I suggest this **unitative suffering** as a way to walk more deeply spiritually and humanly with those we love and serve. Then the Resurrection narratives become real celebration of Hope and helps us to encourage ourselves and others not to give up or to just walk away. May we be deeply grateful for the many blessings and New Life and possibilities the Lord sends us. May we also be Jesus' Real Hope to those we love and serve every day.

We invite as many of you who can to join us on Easter morning in Philippe Park at 6:30a for the Sunrise Mass or at 9:15a for the second Mass in the Park. Many of our Knights and Ladies are part of the ministry team that make Easter Mass in the Park so life-giving. Don't forget to bring a chair. Pets are very welcome also.

Easter greetings! As we roll through the first full month of spring, we celebrate Easter with thoughts of gratitude for the gift of new life. The Resurrection and thoughts of our Savior's sacrifice and triumph over death are fresh in our minds and hearts. That is the wonderful part of April.

The not so wonderful part of April is tax time. It's a time when most of us focus on the income we've made....and how much of that we must hand over to the government. Nobody's happy about that. And nobody's happy about all the complicated tax laws and regulations.

However, now is a good time to take stock of your finances and make sure you're on the path you want to be on. The focus around this time of year is obtaining a tax deduction by contributing to an approved retirement account. 






Marriage and Family Life

In Memoriam

Bernard A.J. "Barney" Gonyea

June 13, 1922 – April 1, 1986

It has been several years since we changed our name to the Barney Gonyea Council in honor of our late Past Grand Knight. Many of our newer members, as well as some of our older members, do not know who he was. Therefore, we have decided to print the narrative which was submitted to the Knights of Columbus Supreme when we requested the name change.

Brother Bernard A.J. (Barney) Gonyea was born in Rockwood, Michigan, and after completing 20 years in the U.S. Navy, he retired to Florida in 1960. He worked at Strike Command at MacDill AFB for two years before becoming an appraiser for Housing Urban Development (HUD) for more than 20 years.

Barney played an active part in Espiritu Santo Parish Life from it's very beginning. His name is included on the list of original contributors to the Church, and he was a member of the first group formed for the groundbreaking ceremony. He sang in the Church Choir for over 20 years and was in the first group of commentators. He actively worked in training altar boys (including his four sons). He was president of the Men's Club in 1974 and he was a member of the Gregorian Choir from 1982 to 1984.

Barney joined the Knights of Columbus while in service in March 1956. When a Council was formed at Espiritu Santo Catholic Church, he became active immediately. He served the Council as Recorder, Deputy Grand Knight, and Grand Knight (he had just been elected to a second term as Grand Knight). He was also active in the Pinellas County chapter of the Knights of Columbus and served as it's Secretary in 1980-81. He joined the Fourth Degree in 1979 and in the Monsignor Leo M. Finn Assembly of Clearwater, he served as Faithful Scribe, Captain, Navigator and Admiral. He was Secretary to the Master, North Florida District, for three years. On July 9, 1984, he was selected District Warden for District 21 but was never able to serve in that position. Sir Knight Barney Gonyea was the Class Honoree of the November 10, 1984 Exemplification of the Fourth Degree, Northern District.

On July 10,1984 Barney was shot in the head by a disturbed co-worker in his office. He never regained consciousness and he laid in a coma until his death on April 8,1986.

Barney Gonyea was a credit to his Church and his beloved Knights of Columbus. His smile, dedication and willingness to work always found him in the center of KofC and Church activities. He and his wife, Kitty Gonyea, lived in this area for nearly 25 years where they raised their five children, one daughter and four sons.





Unity, Charity and Fraternity...Be the Light?

Lent is a time of reflection and time to think about how we can become a better person with each passing day. The readings of the Fourth Sunday of Lent gives plenty to think about in terms of our mission as Knights.

In the Gospel, it tells us, "As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither he nor his parents sinned; it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him. We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day. Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

What do we learn from that? Maybe one lesson is not to be so cynical and judgmental. Even His disciples when encountering the blind man assumed somebody messed up and was to be blamed and held accountable. But Jesus tells them, "Not so fast guys. Everything has a purpose, and everything can be turned to good if you can see through the fog."

In the second reading, Paul tells the Ephesians, "Brothers and sisters: You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth. Try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness."

Again, we're being told that everything has a purpose, and a plan and God's plan is for us to live in the light if the Lord. Could there be any more perfect readings for our vows of unity, charity and fraternity.

- Don't be so quick to judge and blame others; everything has it's purpose
- Can we find a find a way to help others especially in a world that can seem and act so dark
- Live with an attitude of gratitude and be the light!

From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

'A Humble Worker'

Pope Benedict XVI was a friend of the Order whose life and teachings radiated his profound faith in Christ

The death of a truly holy and beloved person, especially when that person is a former pope, is an extraordinary thing. It is a personal loss for countless Catholics, but also a moment of historical significance. I am still reflecting on what it meant to attend the funeral of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI in early January. It was certainly a sad occasion, as we said farewell to a faithful servant and spiritual father. Yet, it was also an occasion of great gratitude. I was proud to represent the Order. But I was doubly proud and grateful simply to be a Catholic — to be part of a Church that produces men of such caliber as Pope Benedict.

I was also proud of our unity as a Church — that we came together to mark the life of this great man. For three days, from early morning till night, thousands of people waited in line to enter St. Peter's Basilica to pay their last respects and to pray. Tens of thousands attended the funeral Mass, presided over by Pope Francis. They were all there to honor this man who aimed to be, as he said upon his election as pope in 2005, "a humble worker in the vineyard of the Lord."

Our late pope was a great friend to the Knights of Columbus. He knew us well and appreciated what we were about.

In 2008, during his visit to the United States, Pope Benedict XVI celebrated Mass at New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral, which is affectionately called "America's parish church." He used that unique setting to talk about America's quintessential parish priest. He was speaking, of course, about Father Michael McGivney.

In his homily, Pope Benedict praised "the remarkable accomplishment of that exemplary American priest, the Venerable Michael McGivney, whose vision and zeal led to the establishment of the Knights of Columbus."

The pope knew of whom he spoke. Just one month before his visit to the United States, he had approved the "decree of heroic virtue" for Father McGivney, opening the path to his eventual beatification in 2020.

It is fair to say that without Pope Benedict's love for the Knights and admiration for Father McGivney, who likewise lived as "a humble worker in the vineyard," our Founder would not yet be declared Blessed.

Pope Benedict was a man of profound faith, intelligence and natural kindness. He could have done anything with these gifts, but he put them at the service of Jesus Christ and his Church. Unlike so many intellectuals who are in love with ideas, he was in love with a person: Jesus Christ. And he spent his life teaching us how love for Christ can truly transform our lives.

In his first homily as pope, Benedict paraphrased the words of his predecessor, Pope John Paul II: "If we let Christ into our lives, we lose nothing, nothing, absolutely nothing of what makes life free, beautiful and great. Only in this friendship are the doors of life opened wide. Only in this friendship is the great potential of human existence truly revealed. Only in this friendship do we experience beauty and liberation."

In his first encyclical, *Deus Caritas Est* (*God Is Love*), he likewise affirmed, "Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction" (1).

These are challenging times for the Church and for Catholics, but Pope Benedict has taught us to have hope in the Lord. Even against strong headwinds, the only way forward, the only way to true happiness and liberation, is through an abiding friendship with Jesus Christ. We say goodbye to a great man, but his wisdom endures, and we remain strong in our hope that we will see him again in eternity.

Let's have another great week! 1..., 2..., 3..., ACTION!



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


