Worthy Brother Knights & Ladies!

I hope that my report finds you and yours doing well and that you all enjoyed a wonderful Easter Season.

We are quickly approaching the end of the 2022 – 2023 Fraternal Year for our Barney Gonyea Council here at Espiritu Santo Catholic Church and I just want to share with you a brief "State of the Council" without getting into specific numbers. Please understand that any member of our Council that wants to see our Council's status with complete details we will be happy to review these with you at any Council meeting.

As you all know, we ran into a couple of very costly and unforeseen expenses with the replacement of the freezer and the deep fryer in the Parish Center Kitchen. Since we had no choice and needed to replace these two major appliances, we also thought that it would be very prudent to upgrade them to what we really needed to take our council to the next level.

We also made the decision to upgrade the bibles that we provide and donate to the third graders of our school and religious education classes and we spent approximately \$2,000 more this year than we did the previous year. That said, these three large expenditures pushed us way over our zero-based budget by roughly \$8,000.

With one more Full Family Breakfast in May and one more Dinner Dance in June, I am projecting that we will be able to meet 100% our Council's budgeted charitable donations this year while finishing very close to if not exactly where we started the fraternal year off on July 1, 2022, with our Council's bank balance.

Chaplain's Corner

FIRST COMMUNIONS AND CONFIRMATION

May is the month of First Communions for younger children while Confirmation is usually for young people in the 8th grade. Adults who have not been confirmed or are just entering the Church usually receive the sacraments of initiation on Holy Saturday at the great Vigil Mass. I encourage all of you to go to the Mass when these sacraments are being celebrated for your children or grandchildren or the children of friends. Sacraments are actions of the Community of Faith, so it is very important that you join in and witness to the importance of these sacraments.

What is the meaning of Holy Communion? A good number of Catholics do not believe in or understand The Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. The consecrated bread and wine still look like and taste like bread and wine. However, God uses material, visible signs to carry the meaning of the Eucharist—food for the journey. We are invited to say yes to the Real Presence as an Act of Faith. Moreover, Real Presence is theology—the logic of God, who "somehow" wants to be visible and close.

The Resurrection Narrative in Luke 24, the Disciples on the Road to Emmaus, adds further understanding. At the end of their journey to Emmaus, their eyes are opened, and they recognize the Risen Lord in the "Breaking of the Bread." Thus,

Eucharist celebrates the Risen Lord with us

at all times but especially in times of difficulty and challenge. The situation is not changed but we are. The Risen Lord communicates in the Paschal Mystery New Life, New Hope, New Beginnings. Because of the Risen Lord walking with us, we do not give up or walk away or let anger and disappointment stop us. Really, the Real Presence of the Risen Lord in the Eucharist walking with us becomes that great sign of Hope and Possibility. Thus, your presence at First Communions witnesses to the importance of this sacred reality.

I heard the confession last Saturday of seven eighth graders about to be confirmed. Confirmation is a celebration of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit coming down upon those being confirmed. During our time together I made the point to each one that *Confirmation is an adult faith commitment*. Those being confirmed make a commitment to be actively engaged in living their faith in word and in deed. It is a choice and a commitment. I try to evoke that personal response as does Sue who coordinates sacramental preparation.



In Memoriam

Andrew Frank Szeltner

December 31, 1954 - May 23, 2022



Andrew Frank Szeltner, 67, of Palm Harbor passed away on May 23, 2022. Andrew was born on December 31, 1954 to Peter and Theresa Szeltner (Mueller) in Cleveland, Ohio. He was the oldest of six boys and the first member of the family born in the United States. Andrew studied marketing at John Carroll University, where he was captain of the varsity soccer team (and received the 1976 MVP Award), was president of the Marketing Association, and was a founding pledge-master of lota Phi Theta Service fraternity. After graduating, he started his first job at The Higbee Company, kickstarting his long and successful career in men's retail. In 1989, he met Elizabeth Szeltner (Bailey) and her daughter April Bailey in El Paso, Texas and they went on to have three children who were his pride and joy: Catherine (Matthew) Hadro, Anthony (Madison), and Samuel. Andrew was a 30-year parishioner at Espiritu Santo Catholic Church and was heavily involved in several ministries; he was the longtime coordinator of Lector Ministry and was a Fourth-Degree member of the Knights of Columbus Council 7109. He spent his last year of life working part-time at the local John Geigle YMCA, where he was known for his big smile and ability to talk to members of all ages. Andrew was an avid golfer, the most reliable airport chauffeur, great sports fan, a faithful Catholic, and the most loving father, brother, and uncle. Andrew is survived by his children, five younger brothers, Peter (Renate), John (Heidi), Joseph (Lynda), George (Julie), Thomas (Mary), his 13 nieces and nephews, and his three cousins who were like sisters, Elisabeth Filippi (Robert), Barbara Hermann (Hanz), and Theresa Gutwein (Bob). Services were held at Espiritu Santo Catholic Church on Saturday, May 28. There was a viewing and a Mass, immediately followed by a reception at the Safety Harbor Community Center. In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations be made to either Espiritu Santo Catholic Church, the John Geigle YMCA, or the Knights of Columbus.





Saint John Paul II Apostle of Mercy

Recently I was informed of a video produced by the Knights of Columbus entitled John Paul II Apostle of Mercy. It reflects on his great devotion to the infinite mercy that God has for His people and the influence of Saint Faustina Kowalska on his life. It is brief, 8 minutes or so, and well worth the watch. The video covers the Pope's boyhood during WWII in Poland and his dedication and vocation to the priesthood as well as the consistent influence of Saint Faustina of the Blessed Sacrament. Saint Faustina came from a large, peasant family who had apparitions of Christ from an early age. She left home at 18 with nothing but the clothes on her back to try and enter a convent. Due to her lack of education, she worked as a maid to earn money and



was turned down by numerous convents, in one case, with the assessment that "we don't take maids here". But she persisted and eventually was promised entry to a convent when she had enough money to pay for her habit. That took over a year and she formally entered the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy at 20 years of age in age in 1926. She was a mystic and her convent work

was menial, including work as a maid and a gardener but her devotion to Divine Mercy grew as did her apparitions. She passed in 1938 and warned of the coming war which would devastate Poland.

In one of her apparitions, she was called by Jesus to render a painting of her vision with the signature "Jesus I trust in you". Not being able to paint, she eventually met a priest, who became her spiritual advisor, who engaged a friend to create the painting. Christ also told her the He wanted the image to be

"solemnly blessed the first Sunday after Easter and that Sunday is to be known as the Feast of Mercy."

Her writings, including the <u>Divine Mercy Chaplet</u>, were assisted by Father Michael Sopocko (who initially had her psychologically evaluated but came to believe), were

formally banned from circulation within the Catholic church for almost two decades (1959-1978) due to "serious theological reservations and what Vatican evaluators felt to be an excessive focus on Faustina herself."

Pope John Paul II was very much aware of the writings and devotion of Saint Faustina and shared that devotion himself. In fact, the Holy See directed then Bishop Karol Woltyja, to open the investigation into her life. As Pope John Paul II, he later both beatified and eventually canonized Saint Faustina on April 30, 2000.

Pope John Paul II observed, "The message she brought is the appropriate and incisive answer that God wanted to offer to the questions and expectations of human beings in our time, marked by terrible tragedies. Jesus said to Sr. Faustina one day: 'Humanity will never find peace until it turns with trust to the Divine Mercy."". Pope John Paul II died on the eve of Divine Mercy Sunday 2005 which is now celebrated the Second Sunday after Easter.

Our Rosary group recently prayed the Divine Mercy Chaplet in conjunction with the Sorrowful Mysteries. The primary prayer said in place of the Hail Mary in each decade is, "For the sake of his sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world." God's mercy it's infinite and Divine.

From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

Merciful Like the Father

We are called to live in the truth and to love our neighbor, reserving judgment and practicing forgiveness

Ours is a time that calls for the proclamation of eternal truths, for standing boldly and inviting others to what we know is "a still more excellent way" (1 Cor 12:31).

At the same time, ours is a climate that tempts us into hypercriticism and an almost dehumanized judgment that goes beyond calling one another into the truth.

Last month, in a Lenten Gospel reading, we heard Christ say, "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." Our Lord then drilled down and gave his disciples more detailed instruction on what, exactly, it means to be merciful. "Stop judging, and you will not be judged. Stop condemning and you will not be condemned," he said. "For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you" (Lk 6:36-38).

Stop judging. Stop condemning. These words are hard for us to hear. But the truth is also hard for us to hear, and yet we need it just as much! As Christians, our task is to reconcile these two callings by imitating the Lord, who is "abounding in mercy and truth" (Ps 86:15).

For most of us, criticism comes very easily. It's the easiest of habits to fall into and an extremely hard one to break. The far more difficult thing is to offer the benefit of the doubt, to turn the other cheek, to be "merciful like the Father."

It's a tremendous irony that when we judge and condemn, we attempt to assume the place of God. We give into that original human temptation to rebel and to "become like gods" (Gen 3:5). And yet we do so in the precise moment that our Lord is calling us to be like God in exhibiting mercy!

Of course, our human expression of mercy can never match the Father's, which is based on a complete and perfect understanding of the truth of the matter. He knows each of us better than we know ourselves. Our human judgments will always be flawed, clouded as they are by our own pride and selfishness. Through that clouded lens, we often fail to see others as God does, as brothers and sisters made in his image and likeness.

Can our judgments be true? Certainly. But rather than bearing lasting fruit, they often pull us into a cycle of negativity and resentment that hurts us as much as it does those we are criticizing.

One of the great Christian witnesses of the 20th century was Venerable Cardinal François-Xavier Nguyen Van Thuân, who was imprisoned by the communist North Vietnamese government for 13 years. He wrote of the prison we create for ourselves through judgment and condemnation: "To remember a person's defects is to hold onto the past and to concentrate on that person's worst side, as if no other existed! No one's life is frozen; everyone is constantly evolving, changing, growing. You must concentrate your entire attention on the present and future, rather than on the past."

For each of us, there will be a judgment and a measuring — that is clear in Jesus' words. But it is the Lord who will judge and who will measure each of us — both according to how we follow God's commandments, and how well we adhere to Christ's "new commandment" to love one another (Jn 13:34).

Especially in these days of cultural confusion, we must offer the truth in love (Eph 4:15). We must offer fraternal correction at times and call our brothers to the more excellent way. But we must do so with a clear understanding of the imperfections in our knowledge of ourselves and others, and therefore be slow to judge and quick to forgive.

If we are to be brothers, we must strive to look at one another as the Father does. Our task is to know, love and serve God and to proclaim his eternal truths, all the while being witnesses of his mercy.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.




