Chaplain's Corner

Dear Brother Knights and Ladies,

Father's Day is June 18th

I have been reading a wonderful spirituality book by Jesuit Greg Boyle, *The Whole Language*. He is the founder of Homeboy Industries, which gives work to former criminals and juvenile delinquents. Greg is a very charismatic person and Homeboys is not just a job but a sense of belonging and being loved for who they are—wounds and crimes and all. Greg lives relationship with these guys and gals. The "homies" attest all the time that love and relationship heal. Reading the witness from some of the homies will blow you away. We cannot imagine what some of these guys have gone through. Prison and death are all around them. Homeboys gives them a sense of belonging and the affirmation and the permission to appreciate and be themselves.

Closer to home, I am blown away at the percentage of young people who feel lost and even *suicidal*. Given *all of* that, I suggest we take time to individually talk to our sons and daughters and to our grandsons and daughters and tell them how proud we are of them. Affirm them and let them know explicitly how much we are proud of them and we appreciate them and are glad we are family and belong to each other—no matter what! Love and relationship heal and transform. Our Catholic faith will be evident in how we are unconditionally for them and that we belong to each other.

I think there is a pastoral application here as well to our service of others at the full family breakfast, Pinellas Hope, and wherever we serve. Besides our great and very generous serving, I would suggest we take some time to go around and talk to the people and let them know how welcome they are and that we appreciate their own goodness and belonging to our parish. Relationship and love, aka appreciation and welcome, make the difference. People should look forward to coming to our events because they feel so much at home and welcome. I know many of us already do that, but I thought it was worth repeating.

Saint Anthony of Padua – June 13, 2023

Saint Anthony was born Fernando Martins in Lisbon, Portugal to a wealthy family. At the age of fifteen, he asked to be sent to the Abbey of Santa Cruz in Coimbra, the then capital of Portugal. During his time in the Abbey, he learned theology and Latin. Following his ordination to the priesthood, he was named guest master and was responsible for the abbey's hospitality. When Franciscan friars settled a small hermitage outside Coimbra dedicated to Saint Anthony of Egypt, Fernando felt a longing to join them. Fernando eventually received permission to leave the Abbey so he could join the new Franciscan order. When he was admitted, he changed his name to Anthony. He was moved by the first Franciscan martyrs, and when he joined the Friars Minor, he hoped for martyrdom. However, he became extremely ill in Morocco where he was spreading God's truth and was to return to Portugal to recover. However, his ship was blown off course and he landed in Sicily. He and his party then travelled to Tuscany where he was assigned to the hermitage in San Paolo due to his health issues. Anthony performed menial tasks until an extraordinary event occurred when he attended an ordination alongside Dominicans and his fellow Franciscans. Confusion came when neither Order had prepared a homily. Anthony was asked to speak by the head of the Franciscan hermitage on whatever the Holy Spirit told him to speak of. He humbly stepped forward and delivered an eloquent address that stunned his listeners. Hearing of this, Saint Francis asked Anthony to instruct the brothers in theology. He continued to preach throughout Italy and France. He died in 1231 at the age of thirty-five. He was canonized less than one year afterward by Pope Gregory IX. He is typically depicted with a book and the Infant Child Jesus and is commonly referred to today as the "finder of lost articles." St. Anthony is credited with many miracles involving lost people, lost things and even lost spiritual goods.



June 18 is a Sunday and Father's Day. Happy Father's Day to all Dads, Grand-dads, and Great Grandfathers! Did you know that I am Italian? Well . . . not really, but I've taken the name of Popi for our five grandchildren. They range in age from 3 to 12. How quickly kids, and especially grand-kids, grow up.

We also have another vocation to celebrate in June, and that is the 50th Anniversary to the priesthood for our Council Chaplain, Fr. Michael W. Cooper, S.J., S.T.D. He was ordained a Jesuit priest on 6-16-1973. STD means Doctorate in Sacred Theology, a church degree Fr Cooper received from the Institut Catholique in Paris, where he spent five years and learned French, so he speaks French without an accent. That's Wonderful! Fr. Cooper is also a 4th degree knight. He took his 1st degree on 6/27/2015 and his 4th degree on 3/23/2019.

His brother Paul is also a member of our Council. They were both born in Cincinnati, OH. By joining the Knights, they continue the legacy of their father who was a Grand Knight and a District Deputy. The Chaplain of their dad's Council in Cincy was Fr. Garrity, who was a Jesuit and a regular and welcome guest to the Cooper home. Both Michael and Paul went to the parish grade school until they transferred to the Archbishop's Choir School. And, then both went to St. Xavier Jesuit High School, which Fr. Cooper says "marked my identity and Catholic faith."

For the two big liturgical feasts of Easter and Christmas, the Cooper family went to St. Xavier Catholic Church, a Jesuit parish. Fr. Cooper recalls working the golf course as a caddy, and at the local Kroger grocery store, saying that he was the largest depositor in their parish credit union.

After high school, and with a full scholarship, Fr. Cooper enrolled at Xavier University in their pre-med program, as he planned to be a psychiatrist. And that's when he got God's Call, so he entered the Jesuit Novitiate, a 2-year program, in September, 1962. Fr. Cooper marks this date as becoming a Jesuit, and proudly claims that he has been a Jesuit for 61 years. [Me thinks his Jesuit roots run back further in time, maybe another 4-6 years to Fr. Garrity and/or going to the Jesuit high school. What about you?]

Fr. Cooper shares that who he is, as a human being and priest, are rooted in his Jesuit-Ignatian spirituality and the Community he has been with for the last 61 years. "Jesuit spirituality and training", Fr. Cooper said, "emphasize the importance of the human as also very divine." Fr. Cooper hopes his homilies and ministry are very pastoral and practical, and that they make our shared Catholic faith both alive and nurturing.

Fr. Cooper has taught high school, college, and graduate courses--including 22 years at Saint Leo. He has given seminars, workshops, and retreats as well and has led many spiritual pilgrimages. Fr. Cooper is currently the Founder and CEO of the Arrupe Digital Spirituality Community, which offers retreats, internships, a book club, and weekly Mass--all on Zoom. Fr. Cooper appreciates the close friends he has made with the Knights and is thankful for Knight's help at the Mass in the Park on Easter Morn and the Christmas Eve Mass in Philippe Park. Those events, he says, happen because of a joint effort by a team of brother Knights. My take is that they happen because of Fr. Cooper's leadership and willingness to say Mass there and "share" Jesus outside our church walls.

WHY DID JESUS ASCEND? WHAT DOES HIS DEATH AND RESURRECTION MEAN?

This is written with a heavy heart in memory if all the brothers, sisters and family members that our Council and Assembly have lost in the past year (and beyond). We all grieve at the passing of a loved one and ask why? Why him or her? Why now. The culmination of Jesus's life on earth may help answer that question and provide relief and hope.

Jesus was taken up into heaven in full view of eleven disciples forty days after His resurrection. During that time, he continued to teach, proving the reality of His resurrection and spreading the Good News. He gathered the disciples on a mountain. While meeting with them, he enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for "the promise of the about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days, you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit. They asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel? He answered them, "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Matthew conveys the same message of Christ in a little different way. Then Jesus approached and said to them, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."

So, at His Ascension marked the establishment for the transfer of authority for His Church and the continuation of the mission of salvation through the power of the Holy Spirit who would empower the disciples and followers of Jesus ten days after His resurrection? But Jesus would

also continue His mission forever (until the end of the age).

We all know that His passion and death were for our salvation and to open the gates of Heaven for us. But why did He have to suffer and die and why 40 days of Lent and 40 more until His Ascension. Could His Father have chosen another message to let us know His love for us and spare His only son? He is, after all, all-powerful. But He chose passion and death for His Son to let us know the depth of His love for us and to let us know that life is truly everlasting.

Forty days is full of interesting symbolism in the Scriptures. It is mentioned nearly 150 times. While the Bible definitely seems to use 40 to emphasize a spiritual truth, it is pointed out that the Bible nowhere specifically assigns any special meaning to the number 40. Most scholars assess this as signifying a period of testing or trial that God allows us to go through challenges in order to grow spiritually. The 40-day time period highlights the importance of strengthening our faith by relying on God's help in challenging circumstances. It takes time to process the grief of loss. The existential question why is difficult to grasp, and time is a primary tool.

Dear Jesus, we adore you O Lord and we praise You because through Your life and death you have saved the world and provide us with everlasting life. This is the promise of our faith. It is also the conqueror of our grief. Just like God the Father, the pain of the loss of a loved one is tremendous but the realization that all lives are unique and precious in God's eyes and that we will meet again in a place of everlasting comfort and joy is our reward.

Hope That Saves

Passing on the Catholic faith to our children is a crucial antidote to a growing epidemic of anxiety and despair

I was recently talking with a priest who serves as a chaplain at one of the top universities in the United States. I asked him what his Catholic students are struggling with the most. His response was immediate: anxiety and feelings of low self-esteem. I was bit surprised because these students are among the best and the brightest. But I shouldn't have been. This is a symptom of our age.

Earlier this year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that nearly 3 in 5 (57%) teenage girls in the United States felt persistently sad or hopeless, and nearly 1 in 3 (30%) have seriously considered attempting suicide. Both statistics are up nearly 60% from just a decade ago, and it's likely no coincidence that these disturbing trends coincide with the rise of smartphones.

The pressures upon young people are daunting, and they are often intensified by social media: hyper-sexualization, fashionable ideologies, the temptation to compare oneself to illusory personas projected by peers and "influencers." It's no wonder so many young people struggle with depression and despair as they try to make their way in a culture that has lost its moorings.

Faced with this situation, what can Catholic parents do? Putting aside the question of how parents should regulate the use of smartphones and electronic devices, the most important foundational thing we can do is pass on the beauty of our Catholic faith to our children. It is the most powerful bulwark against the false gospels being pushed on our children. It alone can provide them with the perspective, security, and confidence they will need to make sense of the world.

Our faith offers a coherent — and attractive — vision of the human person. It makes clear to our children that they have inherent dignity and are deeply loved by God, who has willed them into existence for a purpose. It establishes that, as members of the Church, they are part of something much larger than themselves — participants in an ancient struggle between good and evil, light and darkness, and surrounded by a great "cloud of witnesses" (Heb 12:1). Finally, it reaffirms that victory is possible through Christ, who died for us and calls us to be children of the light (Eph 5:8).

Witnessing to our children the truth of this faith is a tall order for parents, myself included. But it can be done. Christian Smith, a sociologist at the University of Notre Dame known for his study of adolescent spirituality, has observed four traits in parents who successfully pass on their faith to their children.

First, these parents are genuine and authentic in their practice of the faith. If the faith of the parents is joyful and life-giving for the family, the children will be attracted to it.

Second, they adopt a parenting style that is authoritative but also abundantly affectionate. Children need rules, of course, but they also need personal warmth. This combination helps children embrace faith for the long haul.

Third, they regularly talk to their children about their faith — what they believe, what they do, and why. Discussions about faith need to be a consistent part of our everyday life, not compartmentalized or awkward.

Lastly, these parents introduce children to relationships that reinforce their beliefs. Children need to be around friends and other families who take their faith seriously.

None of this is easy, to be sure. But we need to have confidence that the God who brought order out of watery chaos at the beginning of creation (Gen 1:2) can do so again, helping us bring order out of the cultural chaos of our day. Swimming against the current, our children can experience real joy and genuine hope in Christ — and in so doing, become a light to the world.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


