### **FOOD HANDLER TRAINING & CERTIFICATION**

Some months ago, I was approached by fellow Knight, Bob Justiana, about some information regarding doing training classes for our Brother Knights and sisters that handle food in our Parish Center Kitchen during our many cooking events. After looking into this further with our Council Officers and after some good discussion, it was decided that we would invite our Council and Ladies Auxiliary members to sign up to attend training classes to be certified as food handlers and managers in our Parish Center Kitchen. At that time, our Council only had two

ServSafe Managers and three SafeStaff Food Handlers, which for our many events was totally inadequate. Well done Brother Bob with your suggestion!

After sending out the sign-up sheet in late May, I received an excellent response to our invitation to attend classes for both food handlers and managers. I am very happy and proud to say that in our first Food Handler class that was held on Tuesday, June 27th, and we had a total of 19 of our Brother Knights and Ladies attend and receive their SafeStaff Food Handler Certification. This was followed up with another class that was held on Tuesday, July 11th, with an additional 13 of our Brother Knights and Ladies receiving their training and SafeStaff Food Handler Certification. With the success of the SafeStaff Food Handler Training Classes, our Council now has 35 Certified Food Handlers for our many, many events that we have and host each year.

On Saturday, July 15<sup>th</sup>, there was a Food Managers Training Class that was held from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM with all four of our Brothers attending passing their exam and receiving their ServSafe Certified Food Protection (CFP) Manager Certification. We now have 6 ServSafe Certified Food Protection Managers in our Council. Congratulations Brothers!!!

I have made up two books for our Knights of Columbus Council that contain the ServSafe Food Protection Manager Certification certificates and the SafeStaff Food Handler Certification certificates. One book will be held in the Parish Maintenance Department Office as they most often times work with the State Food Inspectors and the other book will be in our pantry in the PC Kitchen. All original certificates will be passed down from Grand Knight to Grand Knight. The total cost of the food training and certification program was \$1,350.00. At our next Council Officer Meeting, we will discuss having an additional Food Handler Training Class and Certification next year and each year thereafter with new or interested Brother Knights and Ladies attending. I will be passing out the SafeStaff Food Handler cards at our next Council Business Meeting.

# Chaplain's Corner

#### **CHANGE IS NORMAL AND GOOD**

Two weeks ago, I went to my dermatologist [Dr. Timothy Kelly, M.D.] for my bi-annual check-up. In the course of his very thorough exam, he found a growth on my right leg. He opened up the growth and sent it out for a biopsy. The nurse called me four days later to tell me it was cancerous but that they had got it all on the initial examination. What a relief. I was very grateful for Dr. Kelly's thoroughness, but I am also aware that maybe ten or twenty years ago there may not have been that updated examination and skill at biopsy. I could have eventually lost my leg to cancer.

So just as change is normal in so many other areas of life, so too in our faith and theology. Many of us grew up with the understanding that the Faith does not change. Often theologians, as we well as ordinary faithful, were not allowed to even consider new perspectives or a further understanding of the context at the time a particular dogma or understanding was presented. Today we realize that our understanding needs to explore further the time, context, and culture when elements of our Faith were formulated. For example, our understanding of the practice of our Faith and specifically of the sacraments need to be more compassionate and understanding and less punitive and judgmental. The upcoming Synod in the Fall will explore issues like second marriages.

In the past if you were divorced, you could not go to Communion and often were ostracized as a bad Catholic. However, some people maybe just made a mistake in marrying a particular person or it just did not work out. Haven't all of us made mistakes that we regret but should we

be punished for the rest of our life? [How many American bishops have publically apologized for knowingly covering up sexual predators?] Annulments now are more readily available but not always easy to complete. What about Catholics who have been deceived by their spouses who have been unfaithful. Until now that divorced person, basically the victim, is still "punished." Divorced Catholics who do not re-marry can still go to Communion, but many do not know that. Instead of being treated as "outcasts," a number of people have simply moved to another faith community. Pope Francis has described our Church as a "field hospital" to emphasize a more pastoral approach to healing and reconciling for the human beings we call Catholics. WWJD!

You may have disagreements or questions about certain statements or church practices you grew up with and maybe do not understand the changes you are seeing like concern for social justice or our openness to Jews or to other non-Catholics—especially regarding marriage. Feel free to ask me and I hope I can at least offer some understanding of possible changes—the bigger picture. In Last Sunday's Parish Bulletin Sue, our Director of Religious Ed, suggested a number of options to help explore our Faith, like RCIA. This program is aimed explicitly for people coming into the Catholic faith or for those who have not finished all the initial sacraments like Communion and Confirmation. Since our understanding and practice have developed since we were growing up, I highly recommend your considering being a sponsor for someone doing RCIA. [Sue is always looking for sponsors because our Faith is a communing thing.] You might also decide just to do it for yourself.

We will also be collecting money with the baby bottles again for The Kimberly Home.

### Saint Maximilian Kolbe - Memorial is August 14

Maximilian Kolbe was born in Russia-ruled Poland to a young laborer and his wife in 1894. Mary appeared to the ten-year old Maximilian and offered him two crowns: a red one for martyrdom, and a white one for purity. He chose both. As a young Franciscan friar, his passion for Mary was expressed in the Militia of the Immaculata, the worldwide movement of Marian consecration he zealously spread through a print apostolate. In February 1941, he was arrested by the Gestapo and eventually sent to Auschwitz. In terrible circumstances, he continued to work as a priest and offer solace to fellow inmates. When the Nazi guards selected 10 people to be starved to death in punishment for a prisoner who had escaped from the camp, he offered to take the place of a fellow prisoner sentenced to the starvation bunker. He died two weeks later as a "martyr of charity" on August 14, 1941. He is the Patron Saint of drug addicts, political prisoners and amateur radio operators. In 1982, St. Pope John Paul II canonized him as a "martyr of charity."



First, turn your TV on to EWTN and schedule to record episodes of the 141st Knights of Columbus Supreme Convention. The Opening States Dinner was shown on Tuesday evening, Aug 01. It is being held in Orlando FL. The Gaudium et Spes Award was given to Mother Agnes Mary Donovan, S.V., the Founding Superior General of the Sisters of Life. Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E Lori spoke in honoring Mother Agnes in her support for Life!

The battle for life, especially the unborn and even lateterm pregnancies, continues. Here are a couple of developments around the world:

Minnesota: Joins other states as an abortion sanctuary. Governor Tim Walz (D) signed legislation into law Jan 2023 enshrining the right to abortion. He also has proposed in his new budget to stop the annual \$3 million funding of 25 crisis-pregnancy centers, which was started in 2005, saying in the budget proposal book: that women who go to pregnancy resource centers are "denied access to full reproductive health education, counsel, and And Gov Walz recently signed legislation shielding women from prosecution who come to MN for an abortion from another state. Pro-life groups within MN decry the attacks on life, saying that "it's only going to affect the poorest neighborhoods...we should be expanding our high-risk, low-income population, not cutting it off." [Margaret Sanger, founder of Planned Parenthood, must be celebrating from the grave these continued assault on minorities.]

Ireland: In 2018, Ireland removed the constitutional right to life. Sadly, that national referendum passed 66.4% to 33.6%. Current Irish law allows abortion up to 12 weeks, and later if the baby has an abnormality likely to kill the child within 28 days of birth, or the mother's life or mental health is deemed at risk. Last year (2022), Ireland recorded 8,156 aborted babies. Now the Ireland government is sponsoring new legislation to remove the 3-day waiting period. In 2021, that 3-day waiting period resulted in ~ 18% of mothers, who considered abortion, to choose life for their unborn child. On July 1, 10,000

people marched for Life in Dublin. For more on this, see National Catholic Register, June 4-17, 2023, page 4, and <a href="https://rallyforlife.net">https://rallyforlife.net</a>.

Life is under attack around the globe! Is it any wonder then, that when you do not respect life, you have increases in all kinds of violence? We have two great commands: Love God first, with all your heart and mind. And love your neighbor as yourself. Let us continue to pray for grace to be strong in ongoing and future trials and tribulations and let us continue to Pray and Work for Life.








#### **Bring Families Together**

### John "JT" Doody, Lance Corporal, USMC

After the tragic events of September 11, John joined the Marines in 2005 at the age of 22 and deployed to Iraq in late January 2007. Over the next three months, he wrote letters to his mother about being on the front lines in Fallujah, and on March 7, he turned 24 years old. On his birthday he proudly told his mom by phone that he had been awarded a combat action ribbon.

Just two days later, John was engaged in combat operations when he was shot three times by enemy combatants. After sustaining two shots to his right leg forcing him down, another enemy combatant opened fire on him. The final bullet entered his left leg below the knee, traveling up his leg, tearing through his flesh and nerves. It left a hole big enough to swallow a man's fist.

John was flown to San Diego for treatment and over time his body and mind began to heal from his brush with death. Using braces, John relearned how to walk. He began to dream again and decided to enter law school. Little did he know the worst was yet to come. Inside of John's body, unbeknownst to his doctors or to anyone, a bacterial infection was growing around the lining of his heart. Less than a year after John returned stateside, a mass of bacteria broke loose and traveled to his brain triggering a series of strokes and causing him to slip into a coma.

"It just looked like somebody salt-and-peppered his brain," said his mother Christina, recalling the x-rays. The results left John with a severe brain injury, quadriplegia, and cognitive blindness. "I didn't recognize him. His body and hands were swollen, and his organs were failing. He was on full life support and the doctors told us he would never wake up. But I knew my son was still in there."

Over the next eleven months, John's mother never left his side. After 5 months in a coma, one momentous day John uttered his first words. "I was talking to him like I always did and asked if he wanted to watch a TV show and suddenly, he said 'no.' Everyone in the unit came running in and we were all crying. Later that night, John said I was going to have a 'messed-up son' and I told him I didn't care."

John's road to recovery has been long and brutal. As his full-time caregiver, Christina has tried to give him a normal life, but she worries about his future. "The hardest part of our lives is that I literally have to do everything for another human being. He can't feed himself, turn on his light or even his TV. I am in the process of working with him to be able to make or answer calls on his own. A smart home would make both of our lives so much easier. Although I am in good shape, I am only going to continue to age while John will still need to be cared for."

The Gary Sinise Foundation looks forward to building John a new custom, smart technology home with features that will give him greater autonomy and independence. A safe place where John can more easily and fully participate in the daily routines for a better quality of life, while also giving Christina peace of mind.

## From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

### **Taking a Stand**

Armed with charity and unity, the Knights of Columbus has long responded to attacks against the Catholic faith and human dignity

Last month's opening Mass of our annual Organizational Meeting of State Deputies was followed by a beautiful eucharistic procession. Knights of Columbus leaders and state chaplains from throughout the Order participated, as our supreme chaplain carried Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament up and down New Haven's historic Hillhouse Avenue.

Home to St. Mary's Church, the birthplace of the Order, Hillhouse is lined by majestic elm trees, stately homes and Yale University buildings. The procession was a peaceful expression of piety and unity, yet the scene and setting also evoked the long history of tension between our Catholic faith and those who fight to keep Catholics out of the public square. In July 1879 — less than three years before Blessed Michael McGivney founded the Knights — a *New York Times* article dismissively labeled St. Mary's as "an unprofitable church." The headline read, "How an Aristocratic Avenue Was Blemished by a Roman Church Edifice."

Much has changed in the past 144 years, but much remains the same. Anti-Catholic bigotry may look different today, but there can be no doubt that it is still prevalent — and even on the rise. As one historian put it, today's anti-Catholicism is "the last acceptable prejudice." The attacks go beyond anonymous acts of vandalism or pernicious online commentary; they are aired on national television and publicly expressed by leaders in politics and business.

A recent instance was the abhorrent decision of the Los Angeles Dodgers to honor a group called the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops noted that the group's "lewdness and vulgarity in mocking our Lord, His Mother and consecrated women cannot be overstated." The Dodgers, when challenged on the decision, initially backed down and disinvited them. Then, under pressure, the team not only renewed the invitation, but also apologized to the offensive group.

This is deeply disappointing — and ironic in the extreme. The same people who cry out for tolerance often demonstrate complete intolerance for Catholics and other Christians.

The U.S. bishops, in denouncing the Dodgers' decision, said it was more than offensive; it was blasphemous. As such, they asked Catholics to pray the Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus as an act of reparation. Of course, we Knights spread the word to do just that. And beyond praying, our brothers in California were among many local Catholics who expressed their displeasure to the Dodgers organization.

This latest stand against bigotry is in keeping with the Order's history. A century ago, the Knights prominently opposed the Ku Klux Klan; countered legislative attempts to destroy the Catholic school system in the United States; published books on the contributions of Black, Jewish and German Americans; and spoke out against the persecution of the Church in Mexico.

As Catholic gentlemen, we step forward, always aware that the Lord said to his followers, "Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you [falsely] because of me" (Mt 5:11). Still, while we may turn the other cheek to personal offenses, when we stand against attacks on our faith, we stand for all the faithful. We stand for our Church and for our Lord.

The Knights of Columbus cannot take up every fight. We must choose our battles wisely, following Christ's admonition to be "shrewd as serpents and simple as doves" (Mt 10:16). But 2 million Catholic men can make an enormous difference where it matters most — always through prayer and often through action. This includes educating ourselves and others; engaging in respectful conversation; and making our voices heard in the voting booth and through petition.

Whatever the times might demand, the Knights of Columbus will continue to speak out and stand up for human dignity and the fundamental rights of all.

# From the Florida State Council Chamber...

Brothers All, as we begin the new Fraternal Year, I want to thank you your confidence in electing me as your State Deputy. As I told the Delegates at the 2023 State Convention, I want to see every Council in the Florida Jurisdiction be successful in carrying out the vision of Blessed Michael McGivney and meeting the goals that the Supreme Council has set for all of us – in faith formation, service programs, charitable fundraising, insurance promotion, and membership growth.

I want to thank our Immediate Past State Deputy, Rob Urrutia, for his leadership these past two years. He has done a great job in leading us back from the difficulties of the pandemic, and Florida stands once more among the top Jurisdictions in the Order.

In this year of the parish phase of the National Eucharistic Revival, the Bishops of the United States re relying especially on the Knights of Columbus to assist, and sometimes lead, the revival in their parishes. This is a great opportunity not only to deepen our own faith in the Eucharist, but to revive and strengthen that faith in our fellow Catholics. We should all participate more often in Eucharistic Adoration and Holy Hours at our parishes and pledge our support to our pastors in other Eucharistic Revival activities. The Eucharist is the center of our faith and the basis for the Principles of the Order. If not us, then who?

I recently visited Incarnation Catholic Church in Orlando, which is a part of the Ordinariate of the Chair of St Peter. They suffered a fire in late June which wreaked heavy damage on the church, including the near total destruction of the sanctuary. Yet, despite the fire, a luna containing a Consecrated Host, which had been in the tabernacle, survived. Although the luna was definitely singed, the Consecrated Host was untouched! I will leave it to the Church to decide whether or not a miracle occurred, but these events certainly should be a testament to our Eucharistic faith!

The order has a new initiative in faith formation call the Cor program. This is not a service program, but a method to explicitly incorporate faith formation for Knights of Columbus men in our parishes under the guidance of our pastors and chaplains. Deacon Paul Koppie, Past State Deputy, is our new State Director for Evangelization and Faith Formation, and he will be assisting Councils in exploring how to make Cor work for Councils. Much more information will be available soon from Supreme, but for now, I ask all Councils to look at the information sheet and guidebook on the State website under Faith Formation (https://www.floridakofc.org/COR-Meetings) and begin to work with your pastors to see how this initiative can be implemented. In the near future, Supreme will be coming out with resources to support the Cor program—including a new Men's Bible Study, and small group study guide series called Cor Ecclesia, and new video series similar to "Into the Breach".

As always, our goals for the Fraternal Year include insurance promotion and membership growth. I ask you to work with your Field Agents now to get your Fraternal Benefits Nights on the Council and parish calendars. The protection of our families was the prime motivation for Blessed Michael McGivney in establishing the Order. And with the expansion of financial opportunities beyond in insurance, the Order is in a position to assist in financial security for every Catholic man and his family.



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,


