

Father Michael W. Cooper, SJ Chaplain **Chaplain's Corner**

Mardi Gras falls on Tuesday (2/13). Valentine's Day (2/14), and Ash Wednesday (2/14). A lot happening in two days. Maybe the big question is what am I going to do for Lent? Jesus' first words in Mark's Gospel are *Repent!* That word has been misunderstood as giving up something like candy or scotch! But the word in Latin, French, and Italian, *repentir*, means to rethink, to evaluate, which has more to do with change and **how can I improve or grow** - or in some cases what do I need to let go of. I humbly suggest that the muscle spirituality of giving up something is an accomplishment, but does it really change or improve me or change the world?

May I suggest preparing the meal here or going down on the two Thursdays in February and March to Pinellas Hope or on the two Saturdays to help at Kimberly Home for women expecting a baby - very prolife! Or you might try the ministry at the jail. Often a place of a lot of surprises! (See Deacon John Alvarez). Obviously, the Lenten Fish Frys always need friendly volunteers. But in addition to our serving at the fish frys, some of the earlier suggestions might stretch our horizons a bit.

You might also explore the short updates of happenings in the Church nationally and internationally in *America* magazine or on *Americamedia.org*. You might also consider praying the Sunday Lenten Scripture readings at home or by coming early to Mass.

Finally, I recommend two books. The first is *Aging with Wisdom and Grace* by Wilkie Au and Noreen Cannon Au. This is an easy read on the spirituality of aging with very practical and nurturing words of wisdom and reflection. My Arrupe Spirituality Community is reading this and are finding it very inspiring (Mahwah, N.J.: Paulist Press, 2019). You might enjoy discussing the chapters together with your spouse or other friends.

The second book is *A Voyage Through the New Testament* by Catherine Cory (Prentice Hall). I used this Introduction to the New Testament when I was teaching undergrads at Saint Leo. I found it a solid yet easy read which helps better understand the Gospels and the Letters as well as some historical and theological issues. Because it is over 500 pages, you won't get it done during Lent, so you can choose the biblical texts and chapters you want to explore and finish the book later on.

Again, you can always ask me questions about what you read in either book or just let me know that you are working your way through the book and what you are getting out of it.



From the Life Director's Desk

Saint Scholastica – February 10 – Memorial Saint Scholastica was born of wealthy parents in 480. She and her twin brother, Saint Benedict, were brought up together until he left central Italy for Rome to continue his studies. Both Scholastica and Benedict established religious communities within a few miles of each other.

Little is known of Scholastica's early life. She founded a religious community for women near Monte Cassino, five miles from where her brother governed a monastery. The twins visited each other once a year in a farmhouse because Scholastica was not permitted inside the monastery. They spent these times discussing spiritual matters.

According to the Dialogues of St. Gregory the Great, the brother and sister spent their last day together in prayer and conversation. Scholastica sensed her death was close and she begged Benedict to stay with her until the next day. He refused her request as he did not want to break his own Rule of spending a night outside the monastery. Scholastica prayed to God to let her brother remain and a severe thunderstorm broke out preventing Benedict and his monks from returning to the abbey. God had granted her prayer.

They parted the next morning after a long discussion. Three days later, Benedict was praying and saw the soul of his sister rising heavenward in the form of a white dove. Benedict announced the death of his siter to the monks and buried her in a tomb he had prepared for himself.

Saint Scholastica is the Patron Saint of Benedictine nuns, education, convulsive children and right relationships. She is invoked against storms and rains.



Darkness is not dark for you, and night shines as the day. Darkness and light are but one. You formed my inmost being; you knit me in my mother's womb. I praise you, because I am wonderfully made; wonderful are your works! My very self you know. My bones are not hidden from you, When I was being made in secret, fashioned in the depths of the earth. The Four Pillars Of The Domestic Church

Well, we are in a brief break between the most significant segments of our church calendar – Advent which celebrates the birth of our Savior and Lent which commemorates the life of Christ and His suffering, passion and death which earned our salvation. So, we are in a period of Ordinary time which takes up 33 or 34 Sundays of our liturgical year. But this time is far from Ordinary.

The Domestic Church theme for February is **Promote Family Life**. That got me to thinking of how ordinary the work of our Council, Assembly, and Ladies Auxiliary is, OR NOT, and how that relates to the work of the Domestic Church.

We are called to participate in four major segments of our environment – our members, our families, our parish, and our broader community. And, as we know, the things that we commit to as a brotherhood make this a family affair in many ways. We know each other – our strengths and idiosyncrasies. There is no hiding when work to organize events, conduct meetings, or complete the many things that we commit to.

St. James in his second letter (James 2: 14:26) tells us that faith without works is dead.

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well," but you do not give them the necessities of the body, what good is it? So also faith of itself, if it does not have works, is dead. For just as a body without a spirit is dead, so also faith without works is dead.

James explains that Abraham was a prophet of great faith, but it was his willingness to sacrifice his only son, Isaac, that justified his faith. So, saying you have faith is **talking the talk** and that's great. But living the faith through our acts is **walking the walk**. Here is our faith in action in a nutshell and I think you'll agree this is far from ordinary.

Membership: Memorial Mass(es), Annual Retreat, Year End Banquet, Orientation, Degree Ceremonies, Membership Drives, Monthly Meetings...

Family: Coffee and donuts, family breakfasts, youth scholarships, Bible distribution, Family Picnic, Free Throw contest...

Parish: Seminarian support, Christmas lighting, individual liturgy involvement as lectors, ushers, etc., sick and homebound support, Easter Vigil...

Community: Fish Fries, Gary Sinise Golf Tournament, Pinellas Hope, Kimberly Home, WES Fashion Show, Tootsie Roll Drive, Road Clean-Up...

I'm not the one to judge but I'd say we do a decent job of walking the walk and promoting family, parish and community by the simple act of keeping the faith.

From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

The Courage of Conversion

Opening ourselves to a deeper personal relationship with God can change our lives and the lives of those we love

When we hear the word "conversion," we often think of a person leaving behind other beliefs and practices to embrace the Catholic faith. But conversion is actually a call for each one of us. For most of us, it's a call to the renewal and deepening of the Catholic faith we inherited from our parents. It means actively seeking a closer personal relationship with Jesus Christ and opening ourselves to the grace of the sacraments in a way that affects our daily lives. And it's a lifelong process.

The question for most of us is this: Are we truly open to conversion, to the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit to broaden us and help us see things we didn't see before? To be open in this way requires that we guard against a certain selfsatisfaction with our current relationship with God. Such complacency can lead to a superficial faith — one in which our spiritual practices become routine and even lifeless. Spiritual complacency and pride can lull us into a feeling of "been there, done that" and empty the Gospel of its life-changing power for us. While professing to be a believer and identifying as a Catholic, we may, in reality, live as if God doesn't exist or at least doesn't have an active role in our lives.

The good news is that God is always trying to reach us, to reveal a deeper understanding of ourselves and his life within us. He is closer to us than we are to ourselves, as St. Augustine wrote in his *Confessions* (3.6.11). What does this mean? It means that God is not outside of us, a remote being unconnected to the day-to-day struggles of our lives. Rather, through the mystery of his Incarnation, he shows us that he is *with* us and *for* us — in all the details of our daily experiences.

If we seek God with humility and repentance, he will remove the obstacles and sins that block our vision. He will give us new ways to see our lives and our mission. He will open new vistas of understanding and action. And he will infuse every aspect of our lives with a wonder and a peace that only he can provide. This encounter with a personal God is at the heart of every authentic conversion. And it can change everything.

Ann's sacrifice typifies the sacrifice that so many of our wives make for us as Knights and for the Order. So much of what we do as Knights would not be possible without the support and dedication of our wives. Speaking for myself, I can honestly say that I couldn't do what I do without my wife, Vanessa. Her steadfast love and support — for me and for our children — allow me to carry out my responsibilities to the Order and the Church.

The same is true for so many Knights Order-wide. The Knights of Columbus is and always will be a fraternal organization of men, but the reason we exist, the reason Blessed Michael McGivney established the Knights, is to serve the family. Our membership in the Order should make us better husbands and fathers, and many K of C activities involve the entire family. At the same time, our volunteer service can take us away from home on many weeknights and weekends, inevitably leaving our wives to adjust family schedules and juggle competing priorities. More often than not, our wives are called upon to go the extra mile to meet family obligations, while also serving as both trusted advisors and indispensable supports to us. In short, being the wife of an active, engaged Knight takes patience, teamwork, sacrifice and an understanding heart. It isn't easy, but it is worthwhile because our mission is worthy.

The Book of Proverbs affirms: "When one finds a worthy wife, her value is far beyond pearls. Her husband, entrusting his heart to her, has an unfailing prize. ... Her children rise up and praise her; her husband, too, extols her: 'Many are the women of proven worth, but you have excelled them all'" (31:10-11, 28-29).

The wife of a Knight is truly a "woman of worth." This Christmas season, we should all have gratitude in our hearts and — importantly — on our lips for all that our wives do for us, for the Order and for the Church. May the Holy Family, whose feast we celebrate Dec. 31, be a model and guide for us.

From the Florida State Council Chamber...

A Very Successful First Half

I hope that you and your families have had a blessed Christmas season, and I wish all of you the best in this New Year! Overall, the Order here in Florida has had a very successful first-half of the Fraternal Year. Councils have been conducting many meaningful activities and programs in support of their parishes and communities. Membership recruitment has been robust--118 Councils are at 50% or more of their membership goals, and 47 Councils have already met or exceeded 100% of their membership goals. And there are many Councils initiating or exploring the new Cor initiative.

However, there is still some work to do for many Councils to meet Star Council goals.

--245 active Councils have not yet conducted or participated in a Fraternal Benefit Event--2 events are required for each Council with a total of 14 unique participants.

--228 active Councils are not yet Safe Environment Compliant.

--And 87 active Councils have yet to recruit a member this year.

If you find that your Council is behind, there is still plenty of time to meet your goals for Star Council. Each member should actively participate in their Council programs and activities and strive to bring the gift of membership to every Catholic man in their parish. Most men will respond better to a personal invitation to join, and that requires all members to do their part. Leaders should schedule and promote Fraternal Benefit Events and ensure that administrative requirements are met. These requirements are not difficult to meet—they just need some focus.

The Annual Fraternal Survey, Form 1728, is due to Supreme on January 31. This is another Star Council requirement, and it is critical that Supreme collects this information from every Council in the Order. Every member should submit their volunteer hours to their Council to help with preparation of the form. Your Financial Secretary should be able to provide you with Form 1728A, which is an easy way to document your volunteer hours.


Our State Convention is coming up at the end of May and will again be held at the Hyatt Regency in Orlando. Councils should be conducting elections for Delegates January through March.

And for those of you that are interested in running for Delegate to the Supreme Convention in August—keep in mind that it will be held In Quebec City in Canada this year. That means that everyone traveling to the convention from outside Canada will need a passport. In addition, the Expiration Date on that passport can be no less than six months from the last day of travel. That means that if a Supreme Convention attendee will depart Canada on August 8 (the last day of the convention), the Expiration Date on their passport can be no earlier than February 8, 2025. So, plan accordingly.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work, May we reflect the self-giving love which you, O Father, eternally show with your Son and the Holy Spirit.
