Chaplain's Corner

How is your experience of God these days?

We are half-way through our Lenten Journey. How is the Lord speaking to you? History often focuses on our sins and our being great sinners. How is the Lord looking upon us? Our Church preaching in the past has often focused univocally on sin and negativity. Yet I would suggest that our Lord is focused more on our goodness and generosity. The Lord rejoices in our generous labors at the fish fries, our cooking and serving at Pinellas Hope and at Kimberly Home, our bringing communion to the sick and homebound among the many good things we do and are.


In the Act of Contrition we say, "I am heartly sorry for having offended you." How do we offend God? Do we slap God in the face? Or does our God rather want us to be growing and to be at Peace with ourselves and what we do and how we feel? Sometimes are some of us afraid to trust our own goodness and let go of the overly sin consciousness? If there are negative areas in our life that take away our God-given Peace, then we need to deal with them. But sometimes our preoccupation with our sins and limitations smoothers our sense of goodness and our awareness of God acting in our lives? Our God looks upon us with goodness and love and is not out trying to catch us in sin and death-dealing attitudes and actions. If we do have hateful attitudes and actions toward others and maybe even towards ourselves, we need to work on getting rid of them. But we also need to focus on the centrality of grace and of God's actions and inspirations in our lives. "See that we are all made in God's image and likeness [Genesis 1] and wondrously made." {Psalm 139] A concentration on sin and negativity do not get us very far. Look at your own experience? Are you at Peace when sin and negativity have the upper hand? Or when you concentrate on grace and blessing, do you feel the gifts of the Spirit love, joy, peace, patience, and hope? [Galatians 5]

Finally, who and what killed Jesus? If you listen to the Gospels of the Passion, you do not hear mention of minor things like having a bad thought. Not that even little things are not important, but have we minimized Redemption? What killed Jesus was hate, jealousy, self-serving leadership, greed for power and money, refusal to change and embrace a more compassionate and caring vision of God by the scribes and Pharisees. These are **social sins!** Jesus' way was and is a bother and a threat to egotistical and "safe" ways of living. So, do we need to take these kinds of social sin seriously, including care for the Earth? We are called to reach out beyond our "comfort zones," as many of us do. Let us celebrate and continue to put our faith into action. The Lord says, "thank you" and not "go to hell"! As my ninety-seven-year-old Jesuit brother Albert Bishoff said, "Two things that our God cannot not do: our God cannot not Love. God cannot not forgive."

asked personally by me several months ago but no response. We are currently looking for a second speaker. Our corporate communion will be held on June 2nd at the 9am Mass.

From the Community Director's Desk

Brothers, as we continue our fraternal year and our Lenten journey, please consider joining us on an upcoming community outreach project. March 2nd will be our quarterly road cleanup day along Enterprise Road. We will meet at 8 AM and we should finish by 9:30 AM.

From the Family Director's Desk

We are in the middle of our Lenten Season looking forward to the celebration of Easter. We Knights are to lead our families into a more robust practice and better understanding of our Catholic faith and the Triduum. Despite Good Friday's central role in the heart of Christianity, attendance at services remains low. In an effort to change this, we are encouraged to participation in Good Friday services. Setting an example for their community, Knights are to attend Good Friday services with their families and have increased involvement at these liturgies. As leaders of our family, our only goal should be to lead them to heaven through our Catholic faith.

St Patrick - Feast Day, March 17

Saint Patrick was a fifth-century Romano-British Christian missionary and bishop in Ireland. Known as "the Apostle of Ireland", he is the primary patron saint of Ireland, the other patron saints being Brigid of Kildare and Columba. Patrick was never formally canonized, having lived before the current laws of the Catholic Church in these matters. Nevertheless, he is venerated as a saint in the Catholic Church, the Lutheran church, the Church of Ireland (part of the Anglican Communion), and in the Eastern Orthodox Church, where he is regarded as equal-to-theapostles and Enlightener of Ireland. His major shrines are in Armagh, Northern Ireland and Glastonbury Abbey, England.

The dates of St. Patrick's life cannot be fixed with certainty, but there is general agreement that he was active as a missionary in Ireland during the fifth century. According to tradition dating from the early Middle Ages, Patrick was the first bishop of Armagh and Primate of Ireland, and is credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland, converting a pagan society.

According to Patrick's autobiography, he was captured by Irish pirates from his home in Britain when he was sixteen and taken as a slave to Ireland. He writes that he lived there for six years as an animal herder before escaping and returning to his family. After becoming a cleric, he returned to spread Christianity in northern and western Ireland. In later years, he served as a bishop. His feast day is observed on March 17, the supposed date of his death. In the dioceses of Ireland, his feast day is both a solemnity and a holy day of obligation.



Do you have any broken rosaries? Bring them to a future meeting and give them to SK Tom Wozniak. Tom has an advertisement at the end of each newsletter, promoting his wonderful service – repairing rosaries. In doing so, Tom continues his Dad's legacy. Tom's father, Ted Wozniak, was recognized in our Columbia magazine with a great article, two full pages (May 2011). The following highlights are taken from that article in Tom's copy of that magazine. Ask Tom to see this magazine at future Council & Assembly meetings. But be sure to return to Tom, for it's a "keeper" for sure!

- Ted started making rosaries, while in the Army, stationed at Camp Hulen, TX in 1944.
- His first rosary was made using piano wire and took some four hours to make.
- Word spread, and Ted had about 100 other soldiers requesting rosaries.
- Ted was transferred to Camp Hood, TX and stopped making rosaries.

- In 1995, Ted returned to rosary making.
- During the next 15 years, Ted estimates he made and gave away some 10,000 rosaries to various charities, foreign missions, and first Communicants in local parishes. His total count after publication of this Columbia article is 16,782 before his eyes and hands gave out.
- In 2010, our Tom was involved in a parish mission trip to Honduras. In response to Tom's request for rosaries, Ted sent him 320 rosaries. [Yes, Tom is also mentioned by name in the article, along with Barney Gonyea Council 7109 in Safety Harbor, FL.]
- Ted was not just a rosary maker. He first thinks of himself as a rosary pray-er. [Even today, that is certainly a great example for all of us!]

SK Ted Wozniak passed away in 2017; he was 93. He was 4th Degree member in St. Joseph, Ml. May his soul and those of all our departed family members and friends rest in peace in the heavenly kingdom of God. Ted's tools and rosary supplies were handed down to Tom. Thank you, Tom, for continuing to honor your Dad in this way.

Psalm 78

Attend, my people, to my teaching; listen to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable, unfold the puzzling events of the past. What we have heard and know; things our ancestors have recounted to us. We do not keep them from our children; we recount them to the next generation, The praiseworthy deeds of the LORD and his strength, the wonders that he performed. God made a decree in Jacob, established a law in Israel: Which he commanded our ancestors, they were to teach their children; That the next generation might come to know, children yet to be born. In turn they were to recount them to their children, that they too might put their confidence in God, And not forget God's deeds, but keep his commandments. They were not to be like their ancestors, a rebellious and defiant generation, A generation whose heart was not constant, and whose spirit was not faithful to God. The ranks of Ephraimite archers, retreated on the day of battle. They did not keep God's covenant; they refused to walk according to his law. They forgot his deeds, the wonders that he had shown them.




In Memoriam

Using Our Talents

We had a great family event last month, the Confirmation of our youngest granddaughter. The CCD teacher chose the Parable of the Talents as the reading. This parable is Matthew 25 and contains three major lessons. It also includes the Parable of the Virgins and The Judgement of the Nation.

The Parable of the Virgins relates the story of ten virgins chosen to meet the bridegroom. Five of them took oil for their lamps as it was late afternoon. The others did not. The bridegroom was late, and they all fell asleep. They awoke when hearing the bridegroom. The five without oil asked for assistance but the ones that were prepared did not have excess oil to spare. The lesson? "Stay awake," for you know neither the day nor the hour."

The Parable of the Talents continues, ""It will be as when a man who was going on a journey* called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them. To one he gave five talents;* to another, two; to a third, one—to each according to his ability. Then he went away. Immediately. "

We all know what happens, the servant given five talents doubles them as does the servant given two talents. But the servant given one talent buried it to keep it safe. When the master returned the first two servants were praised for their diligence. However, the third related, Master, I knew you were a demanding person, harvesting where you did not plant and gathering where you did not scatter; so out of fear I went off and buried your talent in the ground. Here it is back.' His master said to him in reply, 'You wicked, lazy servant!* So you knew that I harvest where I did not plant and gather where I did not scatter? Should you not then have put my money in the bank so that I could have got it back with interest on my return?

To a degree that set me back and caused me to reflect on the core lesson(s) of this passage. On the one hand, the rewards of industriousness were praised and rewarded. On the other, the third servant did nothing wrong and was cast "into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth."

That seemed a little harsh and, for some odd reason, I reflected on my own service as a husband, father, grandfather, and Knight. I continued to think about this after our first Fish Fry of the Lenten Season where we served about 350 meals and that would not have been possible without the literal scores of volunteers frying fish, making Mac and Cheese and Beans, serving food, cleaning dishes, setting tables and all the additional set up, tear down and clean up that goes unseen but fully appreciated by the Master.

So, my conclusion? In essence, the Parable of the Talents emphasizes the need to respond to grace by making a genuine effort throughout life. All the gifts—both natural and spiritual—that God has bestowed upon us should yield a profit, regardless of their quantity. It's not about how many talents we receive; what matters is our **generosity** in putting them to good use. I think we do that pretty well as a Council, Assembly and Ladies Auxiliary. Thanks for using your talents!

By the way, the final lesson in the Judgement of the Nation section of Matthew 25, the King separated the sheep and the goats on His left and His right. The question was how did He judge? The King said when I was naked you clothed me, hungry you fed me, thirsty you gave me to drink. Again, they asked, when did we see you in this condition. He replied, "Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me."

Our lesson? Keep on keeping on and doing the next right thing. Multiple those talents and grow in the Grace of the Lord.

From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

Blind Spots

To truly know ourselves, replacing hypocrisy with humility, our hearts must be open to Christ's light and grace By Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori

I recently traded in a car. It was reliable and only 8 years old, but it had a significant problem: blind spots. Form did not follow function in that car's design. Its sight lines were terrible. Pulling out into traffic and changing lanes were dangerous. My priest secretaries compared driving the car to driving a Sherman tank.

My old car wasn't alone in having blind spots. We all have them - personal traits or tendencies that are obvious to family, friends and colleagues but not to ourselves. Some are harmless, like gestures or ways of speaking; others are more serious. One of the worst, and most common, blind spots is hypocrisy. It is all too easy to put oneself on a high moral plane, above everyone else, without taking account of one's own moral failings. We may even criticize others for the very things we are prone to do.

There are various ways to discover one's blind spots. Some seek feedback from colleagues by submitting to a "360-degree assessment." Others seek professional counseling. Helpful as such things can be, they provide an incomplete picture. We're left wanting more.

Where can we turn to truly know ourselves? Scripture is a good place to start. The Psalms, for example, warn against presuming we are better than we are and flattering ourselves so that we no longer perceive our guilt (Ps 36). In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells us to take the plank out of our own eye before removing a splinter from a neighbor's eye (Mt 7:5).

We find, too, that Jesus knows what is in the human heart. Conversing with the Samaritan woman at the well, he knew both her history and her capacity for discipleship (Jn 4:4-29). Healing the man with the withered hand, he knew the venom of his adversaries even when they didn't voice it (Lk 6:6-8). As John says, "Jesus ... did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well" (Jn 2:24-25).

The ancient Delphic oracle said, "Know thyself," but the Church says to us, "Know Jesus Christ." The Son of God who assumed our human nature reveals us to ourselves and shows us who we really are - that is, who we are in the eyes of God. Moreover, Jesus' revealing light is not the harsh glare of a human exposé, but rather the gentle gaze of divine mercy by which we are encouraged to make steady progress in virtue.

As we begin a new year, we might resolve to try to become more aware of our blind spots - not merely those things that amuse or irritate others, but those moral failings that are out of focus. Let us submit ourselves anew to the one who knows us better than we know ourselves and who, thankfully, loves us more than we could ever love ourselves.

How can we tap into Christ's revealing light? First is a daily examination of conscience, a prayerful look at our conduct through the lens of the commandments and beatitudes. This daily exercise helps us discern not only our blatant faults but also those failings that are harder for us to see. Second is regular reception of the sacrament of reconciliation. Confessing our sins and receiving God's grace requires us to be honest with ourselves, so that we can be honest before God and others. Such honesty ensures that we will never take God's mercy for granted. Third is intimacy with the Eucharistic Lord. When we participate worthily and actively in Mass and spend time in adoration, the Lord's heart speaks to our hearts. In his light, we see light! (Ps 36:10).

One final thought: The more we eliminate our blind spots, the better equipped we will be to live our commitment as Knights of Columbus - to be true Knights of charity, unity, and fraternity.

A 40-Day Season of Prayer

As begin our Lenten journey, it is useful to recall what the Church teaches about Lent. As the US Conference of Catholic Bishops says:

"Lent is a 40-day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ."

As Bishop Robert Barron has pointed out, the practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are things that we do, involving the exterior of our lives as much as the interior and spiritual part of our lives. And by doing these practices, we draw closer to the Lord as the center of our lives.

As we assist our pastors and parishes with various parish activities during the Lenten and Easter seasons, we should also not forget to offer the gift of membership in our Order. Men join the Knights of Columbus for many varied reasons, but one of the most important is because they see the work that we do in service to our parishes and communities.

As mentioned in November's column, we did not mail out individual appeals for our State Charities Funds this year, due to rising costs. We asked all Councils to publicize this year's appeal through their Council communications for our Charities funds in Vocations, Helping Life, and Special Olympics. Unfortunately, it does not appear that very many Councils have published our appeal, and the individual response has been minimal, far below what we had received in our past mailing campaign. We are especially in need of donations for our Holy Angels Vocations Fund, which supports our seminaries and Diocesan Vocations programs.




