## **Chaplain's Corner**

#### HAPPY FOURTH OF JULY!

As we celebrate our Nation's Independence, a couple of "facts" may be helpful.

We were founded as a Judeo-Christian Nation under God. Unfortunately, previous to the Declaration of Independence, Catholics were not allowed to publicly celebrate their religion. Some "private" worship was had on Jesuit farms but the Episcopal Church of England and several other "Christian" groups had succeeded in outlawing the practice of Catholicism in their states and territories. Thus, the Declaration of was a radical affirmation of religious freedom. The Declaration recognized the freedom of religion for all religious communities – not just one religion.

However, despite the Declaration of Independence, anti-Catholicism remained part of the dominant culture. So for Catholics being identified as truly American and not separate or "outsides" made a lot of sense. Even a hundred years later, Father Michael McGivney's strong affirmation of being American with the Pledge of Allegiance at all major meetings and the recurring affirmation of being American patriots made a lot of sense and remained essential in being accounted as truly Americans and not some Catholic wackos

Other forms of prejudice continued to exist as well, e.g., anti-Semitism seen in the cultural cliché that the Jewish God of the Old Testament is an angry and mean image of God. Not true. Demeaning Irish and Polish jokes remain in vogue even until today, because both nations are predominatingly Catholic. Father McGivney started a life insurance program which we still have today. The reason he did this was because several insurance companies refused to sell insurance to Catholics. The tables have turned as even today the insurance of the Knight of Columbus is rated top of the line.

Most of these prejudices are part of the general culture today. Let that be a lesson to us to examine and check out the negative and prejudicial comments we hear every day, for example, about women, about immigrants, about other religions, et cetera. What examples of blatant prejudices come to mind?





Catholic dioceses across Florida are uniting to educate Catholics about Amendment 4, a misleading and dangerous proposal that would enshrine unregulated abortion in Florida. Here are four reasons to vote NO on Amendment four.

- 1. Amendment Four puts women at risk. It jeopardizes existing laws and prohibits new health and safety laws that protect women.
- Amendment Four eliminates Parental Consent. While preserving parental notification, the amendment would invalidate the current law that requires parental consent for a minor to have an abortion, making abortion the only medical decision for which parents have no say.
- 3. Amendment Four allows for late term abortions. Viability is not defined in the amendment but it's generally accepted to be about six months of pregnancy. Also, a health loophole in the amendment would allow for extremely late-term abortions, when a child could survive outside the womb.
- 4. Amendment Four weakens medical doctor requirements. Some employees of abortion clinics, such as nurses and counselors could approve late term abortions, even though they are not doctors.



#### What's Your Apple?

I was recently struck by the Mass readings from the Tenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. It was from the third book of Genesis but has a tremendous amount of prophecy of who we can tend to be as human beings and have "evolved" as a society.

It opens simply enough when God asks Adam where he was. Adam replied that he heard God but hid because he was naked. Second, question from God. "How did you know you were naked? You ate of the tree of forbidden fruit!" Quick on his feet, Adam refuses accountability, tries to deflect blame and says, "that woman **You** put here gave it to me so I ate it".

God asks the woman, OK what's your side of this? Like Adam she defers and notes that serpent **You** put here tricked me. Starting to get the picture here? No accountability, deflect the answer, get out of the path of blame, make up your own rules.

God does indeed put the blame on the serpent and commands, "on your belly shall you crawl, and dirt shall you eat all the days of your life. I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel."

The Gospel of Mark covers Jesus building crowds as He traveled through Galilee performing miracles, curing the sick and casting out demons. Tellingly, "Whenever unclean spirits saw him they would fall down before him and shout, "You are the Son of God." He warned them sternly not to make him known.

He came home and His relatives were even concerned that Jesus was "out of His mind" and possessed by Beelzebub.

But Jesus quickly sets them all straight. "Summoning them, he began to speak to them in parables, "How can Satan drive out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand; that is the end of him. But no one can enter a strong man's house to plunder his property unless he first ties up the strong man. Then he can plunder his house. Amen, I say to you, all sins and all blasphemies that people utter will be forgiven them. But whoever blasphemes against the holy Spirit will never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an everlasting sin." For they had said, "He has an unclean spirit."

Think of the deception in our lives today, the constant confusion and divisions in our families, society and even our Church at times. We know a couple things. First, the battle between good and evil is eternal. Second, that Christ is not Satan and Satan cannot drive out Satan. But Satan can throw many increasingly sophisticated and attractive temptations at us that we have to constantly sort out. We also learn that blasphemy against the Holy Spirit is guilty of everlasting sin as they have the unclean spirit and will eat dirt forever.

#### Who is really family? Christ reminds us that "whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

So, in the end, what is your apple? Are you aware of it? Remember we belong to a Church which is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic and have chosen a brotherhood which is based on the principles of Unity, Charity, Fraternity and Patriotism.

What is your calling? Hopefully a clean spirit and simply recall the plea of Isaiah to send him.

I, the Lord of sea and sky I have heard my people cry All who dwell in dark and sin My hand will save I have made the stars of night I will make their darkness bright Who will bear my light to them? Whom shall I send?

Here I am, Lord Is it I, Lord? I have heard You calling in the night I will go, Lord If You lead me I will hold Your people in my heart.

## From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

#### Meekness, Not Weakness

As sons of Mary and of the Church, Catholic fathers have a responsibility to lead their children to an encounter with God

The month of June is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, a centuries-long devotion which celebrates Christ's love for humanity. The Sacred Heart has deep meaning for all of us and special significance for the vocation of husbands and fathers.

In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells us: "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart, and you will find rest for yourselves" (11:29). This passage tells us much about Christ's heart, but here I would like to focus on his self-description as meek — and how the virtue of meekness, contrary to popular belief, is a masculine virtue.

Meekness is a commonly misunderstood virtue. If we think of it as timidity or passivity, we miss the mark. The word in Scripture is often translated as gentleness, which is much closer, but even that doesn't quite capture its full meaning.

Meekness is not weakness. Quite the opposite; it is a sign of greatness — and of real strength. It's the virtue that allows a person to apply one's strength in the right way. According to St. Thomas Aquinas, meekness "moderates anger according to right reason" (*Summa Theologica* II-II, q. 157). Meekness comes into play most when we are under pressure or feel threatened. It can be seen in how we react during moments of conflict. Meekness gives us a self-possession that helps us control our anger, so that we do not make matters worse or, more importantly, hurt those we love.

Anger is certainly a normal part of life, including family life. And anger can often be justified. But it's a passion that, if left unchecked, can inflict great damage. It can destroy human relationships and create divisions among spouses, parents and children that can last for years, even generations.

Meekness, on the other hand, is a unifying virtue. "The meek," according to Pope Francis, "are those who know how to control themselves, who leave space for others, who listen to them and respect their needs and their requests. They do not intend to overwhelm or diminish the other, they do not want to tower over or dominate everything, nor impose their ideas or their own interests to the detriment of others" (Angelus address, Nov. 1, 2020).

Meekness is an essential virtue for Knights of Columbus and for all husbands and fathers. It is the virtue that allows us to master our passions and exercise authority in such a way that helps our families flourish. When correcting our children, we need to choose our words carefully, recognizing their unique vulnerabilities while also reminding them of their God-given dignity. This is important because our children's perception of God will be shaped largely by their interactions with us.

Meekness is also important in marriage. It helps a husband and wife keep the channels of communication open as we give and receive constructive criticism. We will learn much from our spouse if we can keep a cool temper and listen with an open mind to the truth of what the other has to say.

Finally, meekness helps us put up with the failings of others. "If we are constantly upset and impatient with others," Pope Francis explains, "we will end up drained and weary. But if we regard the faults and limitations of others with tenderness and meekness, without an air of superiority, we can actually help them and stop wasting our energy on useless complaining" (*Gaudete et Exsultate*, 72).

A meek husband is a strong husband, just as meek father is a strong father. In treating others with meekness, we imitate the Sacred Heart of Jesus — and we confirm in our wife and our children their most fundamental identity, that they are loved by God.

## From the Florida State Council Chamber...

#### **Address to the Delegates**

Once again, I want to welcome all of you to the 120th Annual Meeting of the Knights of Columbus Florida State Council. We are here this weekend to gather in Fraternity, to celebrate the achievements of the past Fraternal Year, to conduct the necessary business of the Florida State Council, and hopefully, in the process, learn something new to bring back to our Council members across the Jurisdiction.

I can honestly say that the past year has been one of tremendous success throughout Florida. As I traveled around the State on our Spirit of Unity tour early in the year, I was tremendously uplifted by the dedication and enthusiasm shown by so many Council leaders for the mission of our Order. And you have followed through with your commitment all year long.

Hundreds of activities have been reported from across the Jurisdiction, including such varied programs as feeding families in need and the homeless, fundraising for pregnancy centers, providing volunteer and financial support for Special Olympics of Florida, and conducting Holy Hours and Eucharistic Processions. And I know that there are many, many more programs that go unreported by Councils. Service programs are at the center of every Council's mission, and it gratifying to see so many Councils taking this to heart.

This has also been a great year for charitable fundraising by Councils in support of our causes. About 70 Councils participated in the traditional Citizens with Disabilities campaign through Florida K of C Charities, collectively raising over \$250,000, with over \$75,000 raised for Special Olympics of Florida alone. 36 Councils raised over \$58,000 directly for the American Wheelchair Mission. Over 100 Councils contributed \$180,600 to support 261 seminarians through the Order's RSVP program. As of May 1, 56 Councils this year have participated in the Order's Aid and Support After Pregnancy program, otherwise known as the ASAP, program, supporting pregnancy centers and maternal homes, and have raised over \$213,000, which currently puts Florida number one in the Order! And that doesn't even count our state fundraising campaign in May for seven pregnancy centers serving the poorer areas of each Florida Diocese, which has exceeded \$54,000 so far! As for Ultrasound projects--\$390,000 has been raised for 7 projects that have been completed or approved by Supreme, with another 3 under review and 2 more underway!

I also know that many Councils have taken on the new Cor initiative to introduce spiritual development into our activities. While we don't have any good statistics on Cor, I do know that many Councils have reported tremendous success with Cor. As Catholics, Knights of Columbus should never ignore the spiritual component of our work, and Cor is great way to systematically incorporate spiritual development into the life of a Council.

It has also been a tremendous year for membership growth. Already, as of mid-May, 142 Councils in Florida have achieved their membership goals, representing 43% of our active Councils, and another 69 are within range of making their goals by June 30. As well, 54 of our 86 Districts have also met or exceeded their membership goals. Your commitment to growing the Order has enabled the Florida Jurisdiction to exceed its membership goals on May 9, which, I am told, is one of the earliest dates that has ever been accomplished! That is certainly not my achievement—it is a result of your collective dedication and successful recruiting efforts! Now, if all 211 of these Councils can meet the other requirements for Star Council, I think we could say this would be one of the best years ever for the Florida State Council!

But we should always remember that this is NOT about the numbers or about getting a plaque for a trophy case. Those of you who have heard me speak on our Spirit of Unity tour know that Star Council goals set by Supreme relate directly to the mission of the Knights of Columbus, and so Star Council is a measure of a Council's success in executing that mission. The more Councils that can achieve those goals, the closer we get to achieving that Spirit of Unity across the Florida Jurisdiction and the Order.

While we take a pause this weekend to celebrate our achievements, we also should recognize that, in the words of one of my brother State Deputies, the end of the Fraternal Year is not a destination, it is a checkpoint. In that vein, I hope that all Council leaders this weekend not only take the time to celebrate your accomplishments, but that you take the opportunity to get new ideas and learn new ways of doing things. To that end, we are, for the first time, introducing workshops into the State Convention. I think we have chosen timely topics—Knights of Columbus Charitable Fund, Cor, Safe Environment, and

website training. We know we may not get this entirely right, and so we really want your feedback on these workshops. Ultimately, we want to ensure that we can continue to improve the service we provide to our parishes and our communities.

While we want to continue to conduct and enhance our service programs and charitable works, the upcoming Fraternal Year poses a special challenge. 2024 is, of course, an election year. I don't have to tell you that the polarization and partisanship in our nation is intense, but we must remember that, as Councils and individual Knights, we cannot be involved in partisan politics. This is a very strict rule of the Order. As an individual, of course, one may be involved in partisan politics as a matter of free will, but a person cannot represent himself as a Knight in such activities, nor can Councils as an organization. Even the appearance of involvement in partisan politics must be avoided.

However, having said that, the situation is very different when it comes to nonpartisan issue advocacy, and there is a very grave issue that will be on the ballot in November—namely, the Proposed Amendment 4 to the Florida Constitution which will enshrine unregulated abortion and make Florida one of the most pro-abortion states in the nation. The amendment language is very problematic, using undefined terms like "healthcare provider", "patient health", and "viability", which will very likely lead to allowance of second and third trimester abortions and take physicians completely out of the picture. And the amendment, if passed, would jeopardize existing laws and prohibit new ones that protect the health and safety of women, and would eliminate parental consent for a minor to have an abortion—which would make abortion the only medical decision for which parents have no say. The Florida Bishops have issued a strong joint statement against this proposed amendment, and all of us here should become familiar with their position.

What is our role as the Knights of Columbus? Quite simply, it is to do everything we can to support our Bishops and our clergy in opposing this amendment. This is truly a lay evangelization mission, and we should take on this mission boldly and confidently, under the leadership of our Bishops. But how do we do this?

First and foremost, our Bishops have asked us to pray, for without prayer, we will accomplish nothing. A specific prayer has been composed, which is already available digitally. You will see prayer cards in your registration packets. I would ask all Knights of Columbus Councils to recite this prayer at meetings and other gatherings, as a constant reminder of what is at stake.

Second, we must promote the reasons why this amendment is wrong. The Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops is starting to publish support materials for Dioceses and parishes to promote opposition to this amendment. At least one Bishop has already produced a video message on the subject. Let's use those materials in our evangelization efforts to promote opposition to the amendment, particularly among our fellow Catholics.

Third, encourage all Knights—and all Catholics—to register to vote, and to vote "No" to this proposed amendment in November. Nonpartisan voter registration drives have always been a proper Knights of Columbus function.

Finally, in our evangelization efforts, we should also take this opportunity to reflect on why, as Catholics, we oppose abortion. I am certainly the last person to give you theological exposition on the topic, but I can tell you the way I think about it as a lay Catholic. God made Human beings in His image. God took on our humanity as Jesus Christ, and through His Death and Resurrection, He has called each and every one of us to share in the Divine life, body and soul, and to be with Him in all eternity.

What that means is that all human life is sacred, from conception to natural death. So why do we oppose abortion? Because all human life is sacred. Why do we oppose euthanasia and the death penalty? Because all human life is sacred. Why do we partner with and support Special Olympics and American Wheelchair Mission? Because all human life is sacred. Why do we conduct and participate in programs to feed the hungry, house the homeless, and provide coats to children in need? Because all human life is sacred. In my view, every service program we conduct as Knights is based, at least in part, on belief that all human life is sacred.


Tomorrow, we will be hearing more from a representative of the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops, and they will have a table in the foyer. But let us resolve now to get behind our Bishops in this most important task.

I am proud to be a Knight of Columbus. And I am proud to stand beside all you as we continue to serve our parishes and our communities. And as this second year of the National Eucharistic Revival draws to a close, let us continue to deepen our faith as we step up our service and our evangelization efforts, and continue to make the Order flourish in the Florida Jurisdiction.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work, May we reflect the self-giving love which you, O Father, eternally show with your Son and the Holy Spirit.
