"A WOUNDED HERO"

At several gatherings of Knights and at a Sunday Mass in the last three weeks I have mentioned that Father Bob Schneider, the pastor at St. Cecilia and formerly our pastor, is on a leave of absence. Here is what he said in St. Cecilia's Sunday Bulletin several weeks ago: I am currently on a recommended medical leave of absence from the parish as I address issues involving prescription medications, sobriety, and maintaining a healthy lifestyle." Some first reactions have said "isn't that terrible." I would suggest just the opposite. Father Bob's stepping back is a very good thing to deal with some human issues in his life. He is not hiding anything but rather wants to share with his parishioners and friends what is going on in his life these days. He looks for your love and support during this time.

Maybe Bob's situation reminds us that being a priest today can be both stressful and challenging. A number of us also face stressful and challenging situations in our human journeys. I know that he has been very important in the lives of a number of us. He is a "wounded healer" like Jesus and will be even better at his ministry, when he comes back in a couple of months. Father Bob's experience also reminds us that the "shame and blame game" is over in dealing with ours or others' human situations. We are called to love and support one another on the Journey. Moreover, if anyone of us have issues we need to deal with, now is the time. As Chaplain, I am always ready to see you. My cell is 727-655-5544.

I pray, too, that through the intercession of our founder. God will bless our families abundantly this year.



Faithful Navigator's Log

Since our installation, I have pondered the relationship of our principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism and taken these to prayer asking for the grace of insight as to how we live these today in our present time. The metaphor for me is a journey, which presents many choices. Each choice we make on our journey will take us off in a different direction, but if taken together will lead to a new place, a place of tolerance and civility. The **whole** of these principles, taken together, is greater than the sum of all of them. My reflection helped gain the insight that there is a moral basis for civility. As Catholic Gentlemen, I think this is the point.

We can fall into a niceness, kindness, and politeness trap. These are external manifestations of a deeper character, but these can also be used to manipulate. As I reflected, I realized how important it is to be civil. You might be wondering why I bring up temperament at this juncture. Temperaments are a part of each of us and our behaviors. Civility is best considered a temperament which we cultivate. Taking this into account, what are the results of our temperament, which is another way of inquiring about our character and how is it influenced by our Catholic faith and principles.

David Brooks, in his book, <u>The Road to Character</u> observes --

"I've been thinking about the difference between the résumé virtues and the eulogy virtues. The résumé virtues are the ones you list on your résumé, the skills that you bring to the job market and that contribute to external success. The eulogy virtues are deeper. They're the virtues that get talked about at your funeral, the ones that exist at the core of your being—whether you are kind, brave, honest or faithful; what kind of relationships you formed."

It is his comments at the end of this quote that strikes home. Are we kind, brave, honest or faithful, what kind of relationships each of us formed and was I civil. Civility comes from within and each of us is asked by virtue of our faith to cultivate civility. We display civility because we have made an act of the will be civil.

A little further in his Book, David Brooks refers to a book entitled <u>Lonely Man of Faith</u> (1965) by Rabbi Joseph Soloveitchik. Brooks shares: "Modernizing Soloveitchik's categories a bit, we could say that Adam I is the career-oriented, ambitious side of our nature. Adam I is the external, résumé Adam. Adam I wants to build, create, produce, and discover things. He wants to have high status and win victories. Adam II is the internal Adam. Adam II wants to embody certain moral qualities. Adam II wants to have a serene inner character, a quiet but solid sense of right and wrong—not only to do good, but to be good. Adam II wants to love intimately, to sacrifice self in the service of others, to live in obedience to some transcendent truth, to have a cohesive inner soul that honors creation and one's own possibilities."

So, what do each of us do with this information. We must reflect and determine if our interactions with friends, family, neighbors and even strangers are motivated by a deep respect for one another which helps us listen deeply and learn from each other. One wise sage once said, "Life is a journey, enjoy the ride.



I'm glad I missed the Opening Ceremony of the Olympics. Maybe you saw it as shown. From various news sources, it featured a drag-queen show of the Last Supper. Per LifeSite News, the opening ceremony of the 2024 Olympic Games featured drag queens and demoniclooking figures that carried out a grotesque parody of the Last Supper. Three weeks ago, I saw on live TV the assassination attempt on Former President Trump in Pennsylvania. By now, I bet you have all seen the replays many times. And now we have a live drag-queen show on television! Wow!

Another pro-life American faces federal prison time for protesting abortion. Bevelyn Beatty Williams (pictured) is a 33-year-old mom of a 2-year-old daughter and received a sentence of three years in prison. Williams was charged with violating the FACE Act, which carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison. Williams faces an additional charge of violating the FACE Act through force, which carries up to 10 years. Yet in 2022 alone, under the Biden/Garland DOJ, there have been at least 22 peaceful pro-life activists indicted under the act. 

Ready To Step Up To The Plate?

We find ourselves in some tough and divisive times in both our church and country. Probably some of the most contentious in our memories or perhaps our lifetime. The question is what is our calling as Catholic men and Knights? We have taken oaths to support our pillars of unity, charity, fraternity and patriotism. What spiritual guidance does Scripture provide?

In the readings of the Fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time, Scripture provides us the answer based on the experiences of Ezekiel, Paul and Christ himself.

In Ezekiel 2:2-5, the Lord spoke to Ezekiel and sent him to preach to the Israelites. He warned him that they were rebellious, and their ancestors have been revolting to this very day. He added that they were obstinate and hard of heart. But, nonetheless, Ezekiel was sent with this guidance. "But you shall say to them: Thus says the LORD GOD! And whether they heed or resist - for they are a rebellious house - they shall know that a prophet has been among them."

Lesson One. We are disciples and our role is to live and speak the word of the Lord whether we are listened to or not. Our role is to stay grounded in the truth of the Word.

Paul, on the other hand, complained of a thorn in his side (II Corinthians 12:7-10). He added that because he was blessed with an abundance of revelations about the Divinity and mission of Christ, an angel of Satan was sent to beat him and keep him from being too elated. He asked God for relief three times and was given this advice, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Paul's lesson? Therefore, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

Lesson Two. Like Paul, we have taken the mission of being soldiers of Christ and defenders of the faith. I'm sure we all have thorns we can identify which detract us

from that mission in our families, work and communities. But we also know that God's grace is sufficient despite our frailties and the challenges we face.

In the Gospel of Mark 6:1-6, we learn that those in attendance at the Synagogue listening to Christ's teachings were very impressed with His knowledge and wisdom as it related to the Torah and Jewish faith. However, they questioned the basis of this knowledge since Jesus was a nobody in their view. He was simply the son of a carpenter from some hick town. And they took offense at him. Jesus, knowing this, responded, "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house." So, he was not able to perform any mighty deed there, apart from curing a few sick people by laying his hands on them." This passage concludes that Jesus was amazed at their lack of faith.

Lesson Three. The truth is often hard to discern and may even be hard to take if we don't like the lesson it teaches. Yet we are called to utilize what limited knowledge and wisdom we may have to advance the truth of the word.

We must have the faith to step up to the plate. As we know, in the end, "These three remain: faith, hope and love and the greatest of these is love.

The Reality of Christ's Presence

Jesus invites us to encounter him and to be transformed through prayer and the sacraments, especially the Eucharist

On Memorial Day weekend, I visited New York City with my family to join in a Eucharistic procession from St. Patrick's Cathedral in Midtown to St. Peter's Church in Lower Manhattan. The procession was part of the St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Route of the 65-day National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, which originated at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Connecticut, and will end at the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis later this month.

It was a truly amazing experience to walk with our Eucharistic Lord through the streets of New York. As the monstrance passed, residents and tourists knelt on the sidewalk and took videos. Waiters came out of restaurants and crossed themselves. Onlookers broke out in spontaneous applause. And all the while, hundreds of pilgrims sang hymns expressing their love for Jesus in the Eucharist.

These responses bear witness to Christ's true presence in the Eucharist — body, blood, soul and divinity. And yet, it's one thing to say we believe; it's quite another to let that belief really sink in and change everything — our thoughts, our actions, our relationships. The challenge for us as Catholics and as Knights is to make the profound truth of Jesus' presence a profound *reality* in our lives. Christ himself helps us do this, for the Eucharist is not a something, but a *someone*, who is living and active in our world and who desires a relationship with us.

The way we come to know Jesus Christ, truly present in the Eucharist, is the same way we come to know any other person — learning about him, listening to him, and spending time with him.

In the Gospels, we learn how Jesus acts, how he thinks, what he says. Through personal prayer, we engage in conversation with him. We can speak to the Lord from our depths of our heart, just as we would talk to a close friend or loved one. Nothing will surprise him, for he knows us better than we know ourselves (Ps 139:1-4). And as with any conversation, we must also listen.

In his desire to teach, heal and transform us, Jesus has also given us the sacraments, through which he remains present. We become spiritually and physically united with him when we receive him in holy Communion in the Mass. He is always waiting for us to spend time with him in Eucharistic adoration. And when there is rupture in our relationship, due to our sin, we go to him in confession to offer a heartfelt apology and receive forgiveness.

But if we truly want Christ to transform us, we must actively surrender our entire will to him. Indeed, his words to the Father must become our own: "Not my will but yours be done" (Lk 22:42). A solid help here is the Surrender Novena, a powerful prayer written by Servant of God Don Dolindo Ruotolo. The novena stresses letting go of our own will and placing our complete trust in Jesus, with its refrain, "O Jesus, I surrender myself to you, take care of everything!"

Likewise, through a morning offering and brief prayers throughout the day, we can foster awareness of Christ's presence, offering our every action and every moment to God.

The question, then, is this: Are we simply going through the motions of faith, or do we have a personal, living relationship with Jesus Christ? Pope Benedict XVI put it this way: "Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction" (*Deus Caritas Est*, 1).

Jesus has given us the gift of the Eucharist so we can stay close to him. And he seeks not only to transform us, but to touch all those whom we, in turn, encounter each day.


As I have written previously, we face an election year with a grave issue on the ballot in Novembernamely, the proposed Amendment 4 to the Constitution of the State of Florida, which will essentially remove almost all restrictions on abortion. In particular, it would allow second and third-trimester abortions; create broad "health loopholes to justify abortions, including temporary medical conditions; allow "healthcare providers" – not just physicians – to determine if an abortion is "necessary" to protect the mother's "health"; invalidate current law requiring parental consent for a minor to have an abortion; and jeopardize existing laws and prohibit new ones that protect the health and safety of women.

All of the Bishops of Florida have strongly condemned this proposed amendment, and the Florida State Council passed a resolution at the 2024 State Convention to condemn this amendment as well. All Knights are strongly encouraged to vote "No" on this amendment in November and to get involved with their Diocesan Life Ministry efforts.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work, May we reflect the self-giving love which you, O Father, eternally show with your Son and the Holy Spirit.
