Chaplain's Corner

"HUSBANDS BE SUBJECT TO YOUR WIVES"

Adaptation of Paul's Letter to the Ephesians

For nearly 2000 years we have heard the opposite as we did last Sunday, "Wives be subject to your husbands." Many men have used that text taken literally to lord it over their wives and too many women have felt obliged to follow that passage literally as God's will. As a result, many women lost their own humanity and personal freedom - pretty serious stuff. As Catholics, how do we understand Paul's words in Ephesians today?

Modern scripture scholars remind us that as we look at passages, we can be helped by seeing them in terms of time - when was it written; place - where and in what culture? And circumstances - what were the cultural and theological values of the times. If Paul would come to give us an update today, he would say I was blind sighted by the culture of the Roman Empire which occupied and ruled Israel. "I wrote to the Ephesians around 62 AD after having lived under Roman rule and culture. As part of the circumstances, I accepted the paternalistic culture where men were all important and women were subservient. Thus, women were in no way equal to men. In my pastoral reflections at the end, I was encouraging husbands and wives to be good examples in the cultural ideal of this paternalistic culture. I should have known better. I was wrong and the text was wrong then and today. Husbands and wives are equal partners.

Thus, having a contemporary biblical commentary and using our heads can help us better to understand and appreciate the living Word of God in the Scriptures. Time, place, and circumstances remain indispensable in understanding the meaning of the Sacred Scriptures.

Faithful Navigator's Log

My reflection this month focuses on the question of "what does my future hold? "Each of us, at different ages and stages of life ask this question even if unconsciously. Some ask it because of job change, or a family change such as a new child, or some ask because of the onset of an illness. Some even ask it because death is near.

Some may pray that their current situation will change for the better, that the outcome requested is in fact the outcome delivered. Often this is not the case and most of us know from this experience and these prayers seemingly go unanswered.

Now for a little backstory. As many of you may know I went to college for my undergraduate degree at a Seminary in Cincinnati, at the time named St. Gregory's Seminary. Later it was merged with the Theologate and was renamed The Athenaeum of Ohio. During my 4 years there I met two brothers Dave and Jim Willig. Dave was in my class and his younger brother by two years went on to be ordained for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. Dave and I left the seminary after our college days, but Jim after his ordination was assigned to various parishes in the Archdiocese.

Jim formed many relationships and was a popular and dynamic preacher. Although not a Jesuit, he formed friendships with the Jesuits who at the time work at the Milford Retreat Center. In his ministry in Cincinnati, he was assigned to various parishes and made many friends along the way. At age 47, he was diagnosed with Renal Cell Cancer. This was July 1999. Like any of us, he had to adjust to this news with a spectrum of emotions.

Jim shared this news with his mom and dad and his many siblings. They gathered with him on the night he got the news. Later that week he shared the news with his parish. Of course, the community wanted to pray for their Father Willig. A Mass was organized, and over 2000 people showed up for the Mass that it was moved to the parking lot.

Fr. Jim passed into the arms of the Lord on June 24, 2001. He was 50 years old. He suffered and ministered by his witness until he breathed his last. He wrote a book in his last days entitled *Lessons from the School of Suffering* which chronicled his own Paschal Mystery.

His Spiritual Director was J. Michael Sparough SJ. Fr Sparough asked Fr. Jim how he saw his future – essentially the question I posed at the top of this reflection. Spontaneously and without hesitation, Jim said "I don't know what my future holds, but I know WHO holds my future." It is worth taking to prayer.


Jim touched so many lives that after his death a small building on the grounds of the Milford Retreat Center was remodeled into the Willig Chapel, place of quiet contemplation and payer on the Little Miami River. Jim's memory lives on. His ministry was such that a mass on the 20th Anniversary was celebrated and live streamed by his good friend and spiritual director Fr. Sparough.

One of the lives he touched was mine and I am grateful.







In Memoriam

George Koch Smith

August 12, 1929 - July 28, 2024







SMITH, George Koch born on August 12, 1929, passed away at the age of 94 years from heart failure due to COVID 19 and pneumonia, on Sunday, July 28, 2024 in Palm Harbor, FL. He began his life in Hot Springs, AR, and at the age of 17 years old, joined the Army Air Force. He then transitioned to the Army when he accepted a call for Officer's Candidate School. While waiting for a billet to open, he was stationed at Fort Dix, where he met the love of his life, Dottie. They married there on March 12, 1952, and this began an adventure of Army life for the next 23 years. They travelled to many places on the East Coast as well as Italy, Europe, and Brazil, experiencing different cultures and raising two children along the way. He retired with honor as a Lt. Col. in 1970, then started his second career as a Procurement Officer for a steel company. He and Dottie then retired to Oldsmar, Florida in 1992, where they lived the rest of their lives. He was a member of the Military Order of World Wars (MOWW), the Military Officers Association of America (MOAA), as well as a member of the Knights of Columbus, 4th Degree. George was preceded in death by his bride of 67 years, Dorothea "Dottie" (Belanger) Smith in 2019. He is survived by his two children, George David Koch Smith (Lisa), and Judith Lynne (Smith) Hill (Bradley); sister, Elizabeth Smith Kiker; sister-inlaw, Jaqueline Belanger Lothrop; two grandsons, David George Smith and Timothy Winston Smith, and numerous nieces and nephews. A Celebration of Life for both George and Dottie is scheduled on October 25 at Espirito Santo Catholic Church in Safety Harbor, FL at 10:30 am, followed by a full Military Honors Ceremony at Florida National Cemetery, in Bushnell, FL.

Mary Queen Of the Knights

Last month we celebrated the Assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven. The Gospel reading relates that Mary traveled in haste to visit her cousin Elizabeth who also was blessed to conceive her first child, John the Baptist, in her old age. The Gospel reading includes Mary's acceptance of her role in our salvation in her spontaneous and beautiful prayer, The Magnificat. This had to be a very hard and mysterious choice for Mary. How could she become pregnant and remain a Virgin? How would everyone, including her family, accept her. In the words of Bishop Robert Barron, she had to choose between being part of the Theo-drama, recognizing and following God's will, or, the ego-drama where we write the script, direct, produce and star in our own plan.

As Knights we, like Mary, choose the Theo-drama, and the Magnificat provides the basis for our script including our pillars of unity, charity fraternity (and maybe it sneaks in patriotism).

How? Let's look. Elizabeth in her greeting to Mary concludes with this observation, "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled" recognizing the importance of Mary's choice.

For her part, Mary responds, in part, with words that lay the foundation for us:

Unity. "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior" Isn't our recognition of God the basis our of our faith and commitment to this brotherhood?

Charity. Several statements witness this. "He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation" and He "has lifted up the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things."

Fraternity. "He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers...". We're in this together, by choice and promise. And God knows Israel needs our help in this discordant world.

Interestingly, Mary may not have been the only person assumed into heaven. Two Old Testament prophets, Enoch and Elijah, may have been spared death by God and taken into Heaven and this is documented in Scripture. Also, Moses and St. Joseph may also have been taken into Heaven.

The Catholic Church teaches dogmatically and therefore infallibly that Mary was assumed into Heaven. This dogma was proclaimed by Pius XII in 1950. However, the Church has also taught by the universal and ordinary magisterium that Saints Enoch and Elijah were assumed into Heaven. This IS NOT dogma. Further the Church indicates that it is acceptable as a pious belief that Saint Joseph was assumed into Heaven as well as Moses.

Now you know the rest of the story.

Core Exercises

The Order provides resources for members to grow in spiritual health and encounter Christ By Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori

In a <u>column</u> this time last year, I mentioned my daily exercise routine. Consider this a follow-up report. Like others my age who exercise, it is easy to overdo it. I did just that recently. As the result of my imprudence, I woke up one morning "down in the back," as they say. I couldn't sit in anything but a straight chair. Getting in and out of a recliner was excruciating. Getting dressed wasn't exactly a picnic.

I took a pain reliever, but it didn't do much good. After a while, I began to think that I had seriously injured my spine. Reluctantly, I went to my doctor. He poked around and then he shared some good news: My bones weren't the problem. But I had strained my back muscles in the course of my workouts. "What you need," he said, "are core exercises," and with that he packed me off to physical therapy.

There I learned a new set of exercises designed to strengthen the muscles of my body's core, or center — muscles that help to maintain balance and flexibility amid daily activities. I started the recommended exercise routine and soon discovered muscles I didn't know I had. By stretching the same muscles that I had strained, the pain soon went away, and I felt much better.

You can probably see where this is going. It's not a big stretch to see the connection between core and <u>Cor</u>, between exercising the core of the human body and the spiritual exercises of the Knights of Columbus initiative called *Cor* — the Latin word for "heart" and a biblical word for "soul" or the center of one's existence. I hope <u>many of you are already doing your *Cor* exercises</u> or will soon begin them.

Why do we need *Cor* exercises? To start with, we often experience inward, spiritual pain. It may not be excruciating — more of an annoyance, a pain we try to ignore, deny or minimize. Or perhaps we've just become spiritually flabby. We tell ourselves that our spiritual life and relationship with God are in good shape and that we are pleasing in his eyes. But then something happens that causes us to think twice about our life, and the pain of guilt is harder to ignore.

What to do? When my back hurt, my first move was to medicate, but it didn't work. Pain relievers weren't the answer. No, I went to the doctor to find out the underlying problem and to seek a remedy. So too, when we falter spiritually or experience guilt, we shouldn't try to medicate ourselves with food or alcohol or distractions. No, we should go to the doctor. Encountering the divine physician in the sacrament of reconciliation, we receive God's mercy and discover that we are not broken beyond his ability to repair.

We also discover that going back to the same old sins and failings will only result in more spiritual discomfort and pain. So, a good next step is to engage in spiritual exercises. That is why the Knights of Columbus offers us *Cor*. Through prayer, formation and fraternity, it is designed to help us strengthen not our physical core but our spiritual "cor."

Like the core exercises I was assigned, the spiritual exercises of *Cor* might be new to some. They take different forms: praying the rosary, reading Scripture, participating in spiritual discussions, to name a few. *Cor* aims to help Knights encounter Christ and support one another in growing in faith and virtue, in becoming better followers of Christ, better husbands and fathers. *Cor* is exercise for the heart!

At first, I was hesitant to start my core exercises, just as some may be reluctant to participate in *Cor*. But I'm glad I did, and you will be too.



From the Florida State Council Chamber...

Knights On Mission

The 142nd Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council was held in Quebec City earlier this month, and a very successful meeting it was. The theme of the Convention was "On Mission". In his address to the Delegates, the Supreme Knight quoted St John Henry Newman, saying that "...every great change is effected by the few, not the many; by the resolute, undaunted, zealous few."

The Supreme Knight said that is what we must be: resolute, undaunted, and zealous in advancing our mission in today's world. There is no greater task of ours than to build up families, parishes, and communities that are centered on Christ. We are Knights of the Eucharist, and we are On Mission!

The Supreme Knight covered many works and initiatives the Order has accomplished this year. Of particular note, in preparation for the Church's Jubilee Year in 2025, the Order will be assisting with the restoration of baldacchino—the massive bronze canopy that rises above the papal altar above St Peter's tomb in St Peter's Basilica in the Vatican, as well as a bronze sculpture at the altar of the Chair of St Peter. The Supreme Knight also reviewed the humanitarian efforts the Order has done in Ukraine, aiding persecuted Christians, assisting with Disaster Relief, and many other works worldwide. All of us should be proud of what the Order stands for, and what we are able to accomplish as a unified Order!

I strongly encourage each of you to read the Supreme Knights address, as well as other materials about the Supreme Convention, available on the Supreme website.


The Supreme Knight also announced a new pilgrim icon program, to replace the St Joseph icons currently in circulation. This year is the 350th anniversary of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque receiving her visions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in 1674, and Pope Francis, has announced that he's writing a new document — a reflection on the Sacred Heart — that will be released probably in September. Therefore, in early 2025, the Order will help spread devotion to the Sacred Heart with the launch of a new pilgrim icon of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. We will not be able to schedule anything in Florida until we get more details, but Councils can and should tell their pastors and parishes about this forthcoming opportunity and seek their support in hosting this new pilgrim icon.

Finally, as I have mentioned before in this publication and other forums, the vote on the proposed Amendment 4 to the State of Florida constitution is a very grave matter that all of us should be concerned about. The Bishops of Florida are unanimously opposed to this amendment, and many of them have posted video messages on Diocesan websites. I once again strongly encourage all Councils in Florida to engage with their parishes and Diocesan Life Committees and support the efforts to educate and help foster opposition to the amendment. While we cannot reasonably expect to have a mass conversion to the pro-life point of view, we can help to spread the word about the flaws in the language of this proposed amendment, and we can strongly help encourage our like-minded fellow Catholics to vote "no" on this proposed amendment in November.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
