

## Chaplain's Corner

#### God Cared Enough To Send the Very Best

Thanksgiving is over and the Christmas Parties have already started - including ones tied to Church. Whatever happened to Advent? Waiting for Christmas seems empty. Christ has already come. I never turn down an invitation to a party. It is always good to have community celebrations at this time of year. However, at the same time as we journey through the Advent Season, it remains very appropriate spiritually and theologically to meditate and celebrate the **Incarnation** - God choosing to become a full human being like us.

Incarnation comes from the Latin words "becoming flesh," that is a human being. Our God chooses then and now to manifest the Godself in human form. God wants to be close to each of us and to us as God's family in time. God in Jesus wants to experience what we experience/live as human beings - friendship joy, suffering, pain, death, betrayal but ending in Resurrection - New Life, New Hope, new Beginnings.

What a number of us have not been told growing up: God Incarnate in Jesus was not play acting these experiences and emotions. Like us, he was truly human - for our sake. There is no reason to stay away from opening our life to our God. God wants to share our lives and all that we are going through.

Because God chose to become a human being, God's choice blessed poor humanity as holy and good. The previous negative preaching has no biblical background. God does not make junk, but some of our

preaching and teaching took that negative approach. Where is the evidence of that negativity. "God made them male and female and saw they were very good." [Genesis 1] "See I am wondrously made." [Psalm 132]

Because of the Incarnation, Human History is also God's History. Our God cares about what is happening to each of us as well as what is happening in Ukraine, Gaza, Israel, Lebanon, and the other nations besieged by war and destruction. Because of the Incarnation, all life is sacred, good versus evil or whatever. An Incarnational vision/spirituality reminds us that very normal things like raising a family, serving in our parish or at Pinellas Hope are very graceful events and the Lord needs our labors and blesses us. Because of the Incarnational vision, we celebrate that marriage, including sexual intimacy, are holy!

Thus, during Advent let us pray and meditate the graceful reality of each of us and of our everyday lives.

When Lucy would not marry the man, he had her executed in 304 AD during the Diocletian Persecutions.

#### **Praying When It Seems Useless**

In the face of so many problems we can get the feeling that praying about them is useless. For example, in the face of the discouragement and helplessness we feel before some of the mega problems in our world, it is easy to feel that praying about them is useless. What will my prayer do vis-à-vis the wars raging in different parts of the world? What's the value of my prayer in the face of injustice, famine, racism, and sexism? What will my prayer do vis-à-vis the divisions and hatred now dividing our communities? It is easy to feel that praying about these situations is useless.

The same holds true about how we often feel about the value of prayer when serious illnesses beset us. Will prayer bring about a cure for someone with terminal cancer? Do we really expect a miraculous cure? Mostly, we don't, but we continue to pray despite the feeling that our prayer won't in fact change the situation. Why?

Why pray when it seems useless to do so? Theologians and spiritual writers have given us various perspectives on this which are helpful, though not adequate. Prayer, they say, is not meant to change the mind of God, but to change the mind of the person who is praying. We don't pray to put God on our side; we pray to put ourselves on God's side. As well, we have been taught that the reason it might seem that God doesn't answer our prayers is that God, like a loving parent, knows what is good for us and answers our prayers by giving us what we really need rather than what we naively want. C.S. Lewis once said that we will spend a lot of time in eternity thanking God for those prayers that God didn't answer.

All of this is true and important. God's ways are not our ways. Faith asks us to give God the space and time to be God, without having to conform to our very limited expectations and habitual impatience. We can indeed be grateful that God doesn't answer many of our prayers according to our expectations.

But still, still ... when Jesus invited us to pray, he didn't do so with a caveat: but you need to ask for the right things if you expect me to answer your prayer. No, he simply said: Ask and you will receive. He also said that some demons are only cast out by prayer and fasting.

So, how might the demons of violence, division, hatred, war, hunger, global warming, famine, racism, sexism, cancer, heart disease, and the like be cast out by prayer? How is prayer useful in any practical way in the face of these issues?

In brief, prayer doesn't just change the person who is praying, it also changes the situation. When you pray you are in fact part of the situation about which you are praying. Sincere prayer helps you become the change you are praying to bring about. For example, praying for peace helps you to calm your own heart and bring a more peaceful heart into the world.


While this is true, there is also a deeper reality at play. More deeply, when we pray there is something happening that goes beyond how we normally imagine the simple interplay between cause and effect. By changing ourselves we are changing the situation; yes, but in a deeper way than we normally imagine.

As Christians, we believe that we are part of a body, the Body of Christ, and that our union there with each other is more than some idealized corporate community. Rather, we are part of a living organism in which every part affects every other part, just as in a physical body. Because of this, for us, there is no such a thing as a private act - good or bad. I hesitate to suggest that this is analogous to the immune system inside the human body because this is more than an analogy. It's real, organic. Just as in a human body there is an immune system which protects the health of the overall body by killing off cells and viruses that are endangering its health, so too inside the Body of Christ. At all times, we are either healthy cells bringing strength to the immune system inside the Body of Christ, or we are a virus or cancerous cell threatening its health. Praying about an issue makes a difference because it helps strengthen the immune system inside the Body of Christ – precisely as it is dealing with the issue about which we are praying. While on the surface prayer can sometimes feel useless, it is doing something vital underneath – something most needed precisely when we feel that our prayer is useless.



## In Memoriam

#### Fr. Richard Frank Rosin

August 19, 1962 - December 01, 2024







Reverend Richard Frank Rosin, 62, Pastor of St. Luke the Evangelist Parish, Palm Harbor, passed away in the Lord on Sunday, December 1, 2024, at Oak Manor Hospice Center, Largo, following a recent diagnosis of pancreatic cancer and a rapid decline in health.

Father Rosin was born in Astoria, New York on August 19, 1962 to Richard and Nina Rosin. He made his first profession with the Salesians of Don Bosco in 1988 and was ordained to the priesthood for the Salesian community on May 28, 1995. His early years of priestly ministry were spent in Catholic schools. Father Rosin taught at Salesian High School, in New Rochelle, New York from 1994 to 1998. He served as principal of Archbishop Shaw High School, in Marrero, Louisiana, from 1998 to 2001, after which he was assigned as Parochial Vicar of St. Benedict Parish, in Toronto, Ontario from 2001 to 2003. He returned to the classroom, teaching at Don Bosco Preparatory High School, in Ramsey, New Jersey, from 2003 to 2010. During that time, he received an M.S. degree in Psychology from the College of New Rochelle in 2008.

In 2010, Father Rosin first came to the Diocese of St. Petersburg, joining the Salesian community at St. Petersburg Catholic High School, where he was a teacher and guidance counselor until 2015, when he was promoted to President of the school. In 2017, when the Salesians left St. Petersburg Catholic, he returned to New Rochelle, where he spent one year as principal of Salesian High School. From 2018 to 2020, Father Rosin served as Parochial Vicar of St. John Bosco-St. James Parish, in Chicago, Illinois, after which he was granted a leave of absence from the Salesian community to discern the possibility of incardination into the Diocese of St. Petersburg.

Upon returning to Florida in 2020, Father Rosin was appointed Parochial Vicar of St. John Vianney Parish, St. Pete Beach (2020-2022), and later as Parochial Vicar of Espiritu Santo Parish, Safety

Harbor (2022-2024). He was accepted as a priest of the Diocese of St. Petersburg on September 15, 2023. On July 1, 2024, Father Rosin began his appointment as Pastor of St. Luke the Evangelist Parish, Palm Harbor, an office he held for only five months before his death.

Father Rosin was preceded in death by his mother, Nina, earlier this year. He is survived by his Father, Richard, his brother, Frank, extended family members, and dear friends from the Salesian community.

All funeral services will be held at St. Luke the Evangelist Catholic Church, 2757 Alderman Road, Palm Harbor and are as follows:

Visitation: Tuesday, December 10, 2024, 5:00-7:00 p.m.; Evening Prayer will follow at 7:00 p.m.

Funeral Mass: Wednesday, December 11, 2024, 11:00 a.m.

Burial will take place at Calvary Catholic Cemetery, Clearwater, at a later date.

#### **Welcome To Advent**

The word Advent has a couple meanings but generally refers to the arrival of a notable, person, thing or event. For Catholics, it has a very specific meaning as we await both a notable person and event – the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. It is a major season on our liturgical calendar and the end of the previous Church year.

As a result, some of the readings at the end of the liturgical year can be a little dark as we get further from the birth of Christ in "Ordinary Time". For example, in I Kings:17, Elijah went to the city of Zarephath and asked a widow gathering sticks to bring him a cup of water and bit of bread. She answered, "As the LORD, your God, lives, I have nothing baked; there is only a handful of flour in my jar and a little oil in my jug. Just now I was collecting a couple of sticks, to go in and prepare something for myself and my son; when we have eaten it, we shall die." Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid. Go and do as you propose. But first make me a little cake and bring it to me. Then you can prepare something for yourself and your son. For the LORD, the God of Israel, says, 'The jar of flour shall not go empty, nor the jug of oil run dry, until the day when the LORD sends rain upon the earth." Elijah reminds us of the power of God when He is present in our lives and the danger in His absence.

Similarly, Paul reminds the Hebrews of our mortality and Christ's singular sacrifice for us as we eagerly await Him. "But now once for all he has appeared at the end of the ages to take away sin by his sacrifice. Just as it is appointed that human beings die once, and after this the judgment, so also Christ, offered once to take away the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to take away sin but to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him."

We eagerly await him. His Advent. Our Advent, every year.

As Knights, we are also patriotic. We live in a nation with a belief that all men were created equal with certain inalienable rights and among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. So, we recently faced a different kind of advent in our secular world after, arguably, the most histrionic election in our lifetimes. Over the last few decades our nation has become divided, and our society has seemingly drifted away from not only the belief in a Creator but also the rights provided to us by our Creator. Some don't seem to believe that God created us male and female but rather we choose what form or variety of gender(s) is suitable for us and change that, as needed, through plastic surgery. More importantly, many do not seem to accept the miracle of conception and say that the creation of new life is their choice and have worked to pass legislation to "validate" that choice. We seem to have made a significantly different choice in the manner of government that has evolved and are turning back to the concept that our true rights are endowed by the Creator not the transient rules of men. This is not a time to "celebrate" but rather an opportunity and challenge to witness His role in both our spiritual and daily lives.

We eagerly anticipate the advent of Jesus into our lives, our church and our nation.



## From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...

#### The Anchor of Hope

A jubilee year is a grace-filled time in which we are invited to place our unreserved trust in God

On Christmas Eve, Pope Francis will open the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica to mark the official start of the Jubilee 2025. In the Catholic tradition, a jubilee year, also called a holy year, is celebrated every 25 years. It's an ancient practice, dating back to 1300. The Church teaches that a jubilee year is a special time of reconciliation and conversion — an opportunity to look back on our lives, to ask the Lord for forgiveness and to seek his help as we strive to lead lives of greater holiness. Pilgrimage is also a fundamental aspect of a holy year. Most especially, it's a year to encounter Christ through the grace of the sacraments — particularly, the Eucharist and reconciliation.

The opening of the Holy Door is also an ancient practice that is rich in symbolism. It recalls the words of Christ: "I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved and will come in and go out and find pasture" (Jn 10:9). By walking through the Holy Door, pilgrims affirm that Jesus is the Good Shepherd, the gatekeeper, and make an intentional decision to be guided by Christ.

Pope Francis has made hope the central theme of the Jubilee 2025. An estimated 35 million "pilgrims of hope" will travel to Rome during the holy year. As they pass through the Holy Door and enter St. Peter's Basilica, they will see two 17th-century masterpieces of sacred art — both by Gian Lorenzo Bernini and recently restored to their original splendor with the support of the Knights of Columbus: the baldacchino above the main altar and the Chair of St. Peter monument in the apse of the basilica. The baldacchino is the nearly 10-story canopy that rises over the papal altar and the tomb of St. Peter. The Chair of St. Peter monument contains the ancient wooden throne held by tradition to be the cathedra, or seat, of St. Peter, the first pope.

By sponsoring these restorations, the Order is doing more than assisting in the preservation of historic works of art. We are helping to inspire millions of pilgrims whose faith and hope will be renewed by their journey to the Eternal City. And with those pilgrims, we will once again renew our profession of faith in Christ and in his promise to entrust the keys of the kingdom to St. Peter and his successors.

Writing about the jubilee year, the Holy Father reminds us that hope is the virtue that gives our lives "inward direction and purpose" (Spes Non Confundit, 18).

The Christian symbol of hope is the anchor, Pope Francis explains, because it "helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life." He then adds, "The storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death. This hope ... makes us rise above our trials and difficulties, and inspires us to keep pressing forward, never losing sight of the grandeur of the heavenly goal to which we have been called" (25).

Hope is an essential virtue, but it can be elusive in our day-to-day lives. The Scriptures remind us that, as Christians, hope is our inheritance. The author of the Letter to Hebrews tells us that God has made us a promise so that "we who have taken refuge might be strongly encouraged to hold fast to the hope that lies before us. This we have as an anchor of the soul, sure and firm, which reaches into the interior behind the veil, where Jesus has entered on our behalf as forerunner" (6:18-20).

Let's take these words to heart. And in this coming Jubilee Year of Hope, let's pray to have greater confidence in the hope that is truly ours through Jesus Christ.

Vivat Jesus!

#### **Prepare The Way**

Advent is a time to "prepare for the way of the Lord, make straight his paths". December tends to busy with end-of-year celebrations, setting up decorations, and finding those special gifts to give at Christmas. But it is also a time of reflection, on getting our own spiritual house in order. I hope and pray that each of you takes the time for prayer and reflection and not let the business of the season make you forget what Christmas is all about.

As I considered my message to you this month, I remembered an article that I wrote some years ago in the Invocation that provided a reflection on what it means to be a Knight of Columbus, and in particular, why Order's founders chose to be called Knights. I believe it is just as fitting today as it was then.

In the Middle Ages, a Knight was more than just a pious soldier who defended Church and country. A true Knight lived according to a set of ideals and defended those who could not defend themselves by performing works of mercy. This concept is explained in an excellent article in the June 2016 issue of the Columbia magazine entitled "Knights, The Servants of Mercy." The author, D.C. Schindler, who is an associate professor at The Catholic University of America, states that "...the knight served an ideal as he strove to conform himself to the perennial values of justice, truth, and honor. This entailed, above all, a willingness to sacrifice himself in order to protect the defenseless, the weak, the poor, and the innocent . . . the knight understands himself as serving something higher and more important than his particular self-interest. He is not just an individual, but part of a greater whole."

The author goes on to connect knighthood with the gift of mercy:

"[The Christian chivalric orders] were orders of knights, many of whom took vows of chastity, poverty, and obedience, like monks. But unlike monks, they lived those vows through direct service to people in the world, carrying out what came to be called the 'works of mercy' . . . Mercy is ultimately the expression of a love that is poured out beyond measure: not 'tit-for-tat', but grace unbidden . . . Knighthood and mercy go together because they are both expressions of sacrificial generosity. The knight is someone given a special honor, lifted beyond his natural status, and he lives that honor by lifting up those around him."


It is this concept of knighthood that Father McGivney and the founders of our Order adopted, and one that all of us should understand and embrace.

So, when a good Catholic man asks why he should be a Knight of Columbus, the answer is because of who we are and what we stand for. And who are we? We are a group of Catholic men, founded by a parish priest in 1882, devoted to serving our Church and our country, dedicated to living the Principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism, and united in serving Jesus Christ and the people to whom He came to save, out of gratitude for the charity and mercy we ourselves have received.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
