Chaplain's Corner

WWJD

Pope Francis sent "cordial greetings" and "Assurance of my prayers" to Donald Trump on January 20, the day of his inauguration. Francis finished by saying, "Inspired by your nation's ideals of being a land of opportunity and welcome for all, it is my hope that under your leadership, the American people will prosper and always strive to build a more just society, where there is no room for hatred, discrimination, or exclusion. His words alluded to the question of mass deportation. Other American Catholic leaders, like Cardinals Cupich of Chicago, McElroy now of Washinton DC, Archbishop Seitz of El Paso, and Archbishop Broglio President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, have said that mass and indiscriminate deportation of migrants is incompatible with Catholic doctrine.

Not all immigrants are guilty of criminal activities. Actually, there is about an equal percentage of citizens and non-citizens guilty of crimes. Yet the arrests and deportations do not make the distinction between criminal and non-criminal. The executive order allowing ICE to make arrests in schools, hospitals and churches. This makes undocumented parents afraid to go to hospitals and send their children to schools out of fear of arrest. In Florida ,farm workers are afraid to go into the fields and, as a result, the fruits and

vegetables are rotting and thus destroying the produce industry. Drug runners do not cross on foot the southern borders. They fly! I have encountered a number of Catholics who listen to FOX News' disinformation and are scared and terrified.

At our meetings we pledge to defend the Church. This issue of disinformation, discrimination, hate, and negativity, and real fear and suffering on our immigrant sisters and brothers is not just a political issue. It is a Catholic, Gospel issue.


As I prayed about this, I am very aware that a number of Knights will disagree with what I am stating. I am not looking to antagonize anyone but I invite all of us to pray and reflect on mass deportation with Jesus, the Good Shepherd, who said "whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do to me."

I close with WWJD—What would Jesus do?

St Scholastica, sister of St Benedict, Virgin, Memorial

St Scholastica, born in 480, consecrated her life to God from her earliest youth. She took up her abode in the neighborhood of Plombariola, where she founded and governed a monastery of nuns. She would visit her brother once a year but was not allowed in his monastery. They would meet at a house some distance away. Those visits were spent in conferring together on spiritual matters. At one meeting, St Scholastica begged her brother to remain until the next day. He refused to spend the night away from his monastery. A furious thunderstorm prevented him from returning to his home. The next morning St Benedict and St Scholastica parted company to meet no more on earth. Three days later she passed away. St Benedict had her body brought to the monastery and laid in a tomb. She died in 543.

Go Crazy or Turn Holy

In a poem *Serenade*, Brazilian poet Adelia Pradospeaks of a painful ache we feel inside us as we forever wait for something or someone to come and make us whole. What are we waiting for? Love? A soulmate? God? No matter, the frustration eventually pushes us towards a choice, go crazy or turn holy:

I am beginning to despair And can see only two choices: Either go crazy or turn holy.

And when that someone or something finally does come: How will I open the window, unless I'm crazy? How will I close it, unless I'm holy?

Either go crazy or turn holy. The older we get the more we realize how true that is, how eventually that's the choice forced on all of us, both by the way we are built and the limitations inherent in life itself. Why? Is there something wrong with life and with us? Why can't we find a peaceful space somewhere between crazy and holy?

Well, the biblical preacher in the Book of Ecclesiastes offers a reason. After penning that beautiful, oft-quoted text about how there is a time for everything – a time to be born and to a time to die; a time to plant and a time to harvest; a time to break down and a time to heal; a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance; a time to embrace and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to keep silent and a time to speak; a time for love and a time for hate; and a time for war and a time for peace - he offers us this. God has laid out a beautiful rhythm for life and has made everything beautiful in its own time, but God has put timelessness into the human heart so that we are out of sync with the seasons from beginning to end. God has established a beautiful rhythm to nature; but we, unlike the physical elements and the plants and the animals who don't have timelessness in their souls, never guite fit into that rhythm. We are overcharged for life on this planet. (Ecclesiastes 3, 1-11)

You find expressions of this in literature everywhere in both religious and secular circles. For example, the renowned German theologian Karl Rahner used to affirm that in the torment of the insufficiency of everything attainable we learn that here in this life there is no finished symphony. In that, he echoes Saint Augustine's famous

line that is as true and apropos today as it was seventeen hundred years ago when he wrote it: You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you. That single line expresses both a nonnegotiable understanding of the human person and a nonnegotiable path he or she must walk. We don't have a final home here and that's why at the end of the day there is no option other than going crazy or turning holy. It's no surprise that Ruth Burrows, the renowned spiritual writer, begins her autobiography with these words: I was born into this world with a tortured sensitivity and my path has not been an easy one.


While this motif is everywhere present in religious literature, it is also present in the thought of many secular poets, novelists, and philosophers. For instance, after he won the Nobel Prize for Literature, Albert Camus, a professed atheist, was asked by a journalist if he believed in God. He answered: No, I don't believe in God, but that doesn't mean I am not obsessed with the question of God. Why that obsession? Because in his thought he could not make sense of the world, nor find a fully sensible place in it for humans, unless there was a God. Without a God. human existence cannot make peace with itself. He likened the condition of someone in this world to that of a prisoner in certain medieval prisons, where they would put a prisoner in a cell that was so small that he or she could never stand fully upright or ever fully stretch out. The perpetual feeling of being cramped, it was believed, would eventually break the prisoner's spirit. For Camus, that's our situation in life. We can never really stand up fully or ever stretch out fully. Eventually, this breaks our spirit and we either go crazy or get holy. That's also the basic view of other atheistic existentialists like Martin Heidegger and Jean-Paul Sartre.

Go crazy or get holy! Richard Rohr offers us a third option, get bitter. He submits that once we get to a certain age, we have only three options left open to us: We can become a pathetic old fool; or we can become a bitter old fool; or we can become a holy old fool. Notice what's nonnegotiable. We will all eventually become old fools. We have the choice only as to what kind of old fool we will be – crazy, bitter, or holy.

being, to act with compassion, and to draw closer to God.



Psalm 139



Year of Hope

On Christmas Eve 2024 Pope Francis opened the Porta Sancta, Holy Door, at Saint Peter's Basilica to initiate the Year of the Jubilee and announce his theme of the Year of Hope. The act of passing through these doors symbolizes a call for all to walk in holiness and embrace hope in their lives.

The tradition of the Year of the Jubilee dates back to 1300 AD and was started by Pope Boniface VIII. Initially it was intended to be celebrated each century. Pope Clement VI changed it to every 25 years in the 14th Century. Its origins can be traced back to the Old Testament, specifically Leviticus 25:10, which describes a jubilee year occurring every 50 years, during which debts were forgiven, slaves were freed, and land was returned to its original owners.

Extraordinary jubilees can also be proclaimed for significant events or needs. For example, Pope Francis declared an Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy from 2015 to 2016. Pope Francis concluded the Year of Mercy with an apostolic letter titled Misericordia et misera on November 20, 2016. The title, which translates to "Mercy and Misery," refers to the encounter between Jesus and the woman caught in adultery, highlighting the profound mercy of God. In this letter, Pope Francis emphasized that mercy should not be a temporary aspect of the Church's life but its very essence. He called for continued acts of mercy and forgiveness, stressing that these are central to the Gospel's message. In part it states, Forgiveness is the most visible sign of the Father's love, which Jesus sought to reveal by his entire life. The letter also encouraged the faithful to celebrate mercy in their daily lives and through the sacraments.

In his message this past Christmas Eve, Pope Francis emphasized the importance of becoming "pilgrims of hope" and spreading kindness, which he believes are central to the Gospel. The Jubilee will run until January 6, 2026, and aims to inspire reconciliation, forgiveness, and a renewed sense of faith among Catholics

worldwide. He encourages everyone to choose love in a world beset with wars, social injustices, and various forms of violence. "We choose love, and love makes our hearts fervent and hopeful." Mercy and Love. Great messages.

The rest of the story. For years, when sealed, the Porta Sancta would be blocked by a special wall of bricks made of sandstone in the Vatican. The doors, when opened, immediately pass visitors to a side altar in St. Peter's which is marked by the presence of Michaelangelo's Pieta. A breathtaking altar. When the doors were to be opened the bricks had to be taken down. Pope Paul VI was accidentally hit by falling rubble when the bricks were demolished at Christmas in 1974.

During our tour in Italy, 1976-1980, we were given one of the bricks taken from that wall. See below. The front shows the Year of the Jubilee and has the initials RFSP. Reverent Factory of Saint Peter's. The back shows the date of the installation and the installer.

He Loved Us First

A renewal of devotion to the Sacred Heart helps us grasp God's unfailing love for us and our own identity in Christ

Starting in January, the Knights of Columbus will begin its newest <u>Pilgrim Icon Program</u>, featuring the most famous depiction of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Painted in 1767 by Pompeo Batoni, the original image is now venerated in the Church of the Gesù in Rome. In the painting, inspired by the mystical visions of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, Jesus holds out his heart, which is enflamed with love and surrounded by a crown of thorns. Framed copies of this image, each bearing the apostolic blessing of Pope Francis, will travel between councils and parishes in every jurisdiction of the Order.

One might be tempted to think of devotion to the Sacred Heart as outdated or perhaps overly sentimental, but nothing could be further from the truth. It is, rather, as relevant as ever in its focus on the timeless and bold promise that God has made to us. That promise is his limitless love for us — a love that brings us new life and eternal salvation through the life, death and resurrection of his only begotten Son, Jesus Christ. Christ meets us in our human weakness, and his Sacred Heart touches and brings unity to our own hearts, which are wounded and often broken.

True devotion to the Sacred Heart comes only after first grasping God's profound love for us — and that is what the image is all about. The First Letter of John puts it this way: "In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an expiation for our sins. ... We love because he first loved us" (1 Jn 4:10,19). Devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is our loving response to the fact that God has loved us first. It is the story of a God who is so devoted to us that he will not — cannot — give up on us.

This past October, Pope Francis issued his fourth encyclical, <u>Dilexit Nos (He Loved Us)</u>, which focuses on the human and divine love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In this beautiful document, the pope makes a plea for us to return to the heart — to rediscover our own heart, our own center, by returning to the heart of Jesus Christ. Christ poured out his blood *for us*, and our hearts find wholeness when they are united with his.

Devotion to the Sacred Heart is needed, the Holy Father writes, because contemporary society is "dominated by the hectic pace and bombarded by technology." The result is that we are at risk of losing our very selves because we are losing the ability to "engage in the processes that an interior life by its very nature requires" (*Dilexit Nos*, 9). We must return to the heart of Jesus, the pope tells us, for it is the "unifying principle of all reality" (31).

Now is the time to renew our devotion to the Sacred Heart and to make it a priority. In many ways, this devotion is perfect for the Knights of Columbus and our families. In his human and divine love for us, Christ sends us on mission: "Wherever you may be," Pope Francis writes, "you can hear his call and realize that he is sending you forth to carry out that mission" (215).

We live in an age marked by many fears and anxieties — in our culture, in our homes and even in our own hearts. At times, we can feel tossed about on the waves of these difficulties, but keeping our gaze fixed on Christ and trusting in his boundless love for us will keep us from being overwhelmed. The Sacred Heart of Jesus can calm the waters.

The Lord is faithful to his promises. The heart of Christ is all we need. So as we begin this Jubilee of 2025, dedicated to the virtue of hope, let us follow the wisdom of the Psalmist, who said it best: "Be strong and take heart, all who hope in the Lord" (Ps 31:25).



Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.


In our daily life and work,
